#### NEW MAIL ROUTE.

While we in Markdale are well served with postal facilities, having two mails a day each way, we would not forget those who are not so fortunate, or in fact are very poorly accommodated. Walter's Falls for instance, a prosperous village twelve miles distant, with but two mails a week. This is an age of progress, and year by year the rural community are becoming more anxious to know the doings of the world, and to have the news prompt and direct from the press. We can see no valid reason why Walter's Falls may not have a tri-weekly mail from both Markdale and Meaford, thus serving a large number of ratepayers between those points. As it is, the mail is conveyed on Tuesday and Friday each week from Walter's Falls to Meaford and return, while it is forwarded from Markdale to Harkaway every Friday. Now Harkaway is only five miles from Walter's Falls, direct on the way, thus leaving a gap of only five miles to be supplied.
