CORPORATION SALTED.—Action for damages against the Corporation of the Village of Arthur for injuries received in falling off a bridge. It appears that Messrs. John Madden and James Burns drove to the village of Arthur on the 1st of October last, to attend to some business. It was late before they got through and the night was very dark when they started for home. In crossing a bridge in the village they were met by another conveyance and a collision occurred, and the plaintiffs were thrown into the river—a distance of fourteen feet—sustaining injuries from which they have not yet recovered. In addition to this Burns horse was killed and his buggy and harness completely destroyed. A verdict was given allowing Mr. Madden \$2,000 and Mr. Burns \$500 damages.—[Review.]

**Killed by an Unmanageable Horse**  
SHELburne, May 28.—To day as George Gorwood, a farmer living out about three miles from Shelburne, was starting for home, his horse became unmanageable, throwing him out. His head struck the sidewalk. Drs. Norton and Bolstin were in attendance but Mr. Gorwood died in about three hours afterwards, leaving a family of eight children. His wife was buried only a week ago.
