Legendary Weapons

Curious and interesting particular as the are found in some of the Vedas and the commentaries on the ancient writings. The bows varied in length from the length of man's arm to 4 cubits or 6 feet, of which the latter dimension was considered the best. They were made of metal, horn, or wood; but the best bows were constructed from the bamboo cut at the end of Autumn. The arrows also varied in length from 3 feet to 5 er 6. They were tipped with steel points variously shaped, needle or lance pointed, semicircular, dentiferm, deuble-edged er jagged like a saw, and these forms of points are to day to be found on the arrows of many of the aberiginal tribes of India. The shafts were greased or anointed to facilitate their flight; but they never appear to have been pelsened. Some were altogether made of iron, and it is perhaps these to which Curtain's alludes when he says that some of the Indian archers shot with arrows which were too heavy to be very manageable. One characteristic of the archery of the ancient Hindus seems to have been peculiar to them alene, which consisted in sheeting a number of arrows at ence, from four to nine at a a time. The swords were, as in later days, of various shapes and sizes, and many localities were credited with producing the best blades. These of Bengal and Behar were praised as tough and capable of taking a fine edge. The sword considered in the Veda of the best size must have been a twehanded weapon, as it was 50 fingers leng, with a hilt guarded by an iron netting, probably resembling the modern pata, or the long kanda of the Rajput. There does not appear to have been any special distribution of weapons to combatants of different ranks, though bows and arrows, maces javelins, swords, and shields seem to have peen the principal arms of the chiefs, who went to battle mounted on charlets, while their fellowers carried in addition spears and axes of various forms, and other missiles of different kinds.

Killing His Brother.

In the Wilson case, Mentrese, Col., the defence put their client on the stand. He teld his story in a plain, straightforward way, without emotion, giving a minute description of how the tragedy cocurred. He

"Prentiss was my brother. When in a passion he was a maniac. On Sunday he struck me in the face, nearly breaking my nose. Toward evening he ordered me to get supper. I told him I did not feel well, and asked him to get it. I then went in and laid down on the bed. Soon after Prenties entered with a lighted candle in one hand and a butcher knife in the other. He asked me if I intended to tell the people what he said about his being a highwayman, and striking at me with the knife. I jumped and grasped a hammer and bit him over the head, striking him again as he fell en to the bed. Then I grasped the Winchester and fired without aim,

"Then all was quiet, and I realized that I had killed my brother. I saw his pecketbook half out of his breeches pecket, and I took it. It centained \$142. I walked the trail back and forth all night, not knowing what to de. I did not want our mother to know of it, and, to hide the act from all, I dragged the body to the well and buried it, I had been in Paradox nine menths, but owing to Prentiss's wish I did not associate with any one; in fact, I hardly knew anybedy there.

"On Tuesday merning I went to Mr. Galleway's, intending to tell him all about it, but he was not there, and I returned to the cabin, teck the herses which father had bought for us and started to leave the country. I drank liquor in Mentrese to drown my grief,"

BEE BEEN Lock-Jaw Cured.

That form of lock-jaw which is produced by a wound is known to physicians as traumatic tetanus. A New York paper recently reported a case of this disease which had been treated by Dr. Rebert Taylor. The patient recevered, and according to the reporter, the Doctor declares that it is "the only care of cure oftraumatic tetanus in the hi stoof the world."

Is not this statement erreneous? In the London Lancet of June 12. 1886, Mr. William Thomas Jackman of the Royal College of Surgeons describes a case of trauma ic tetanus which came under his care in the March previous. The patient was a lad fifteen years old, whose fingers had been crushed by cegged wheels, and the leck-jaw was complete. Chleral hydrate was administered in twenty-grain doses every three hours for ten days. The results were net satisfactory, and Mr. Jackman determined to try the new hypnotic drug urethan. The chleral was discentiuned during the night, and four grains of urethan were given him every two hours from 6 o'clock in the evening to 6 in the morning. "The first night of this trial showed a marked decrease in the severity of the symptoms, and the patient made gradual and uninterrupted progress until April 20, when his recevery was established.

In the case treated by Dr. Tayler, merphine appears to have been the only drug employed. Any physician who is fortunate enough to treat this disease successfully is entitled to credit and congratulation, but the Bronxville case dees not seem the only one which has resulted in recovery.






