

Orangeville Presbytery.

Presbytery held its first meeting, on the 20th inst., in the Presbyterian Church, Orangeville. It is composed of 12 churches and 120 members, formerly included in the Presbytery of Toronto. There were the usual devotional services, when the roll was called and the members, with their respective ministers, responded. Messrs. McFaul, Wilson, Hunter, Tait, McClelland, McDonald, Fowle, Smith, Armstrong, Ballantine, Rev. A. McFaul, Moderator, Rev. H. Crozier, clerk. A considerable amount of routine business was transacted. Reports from vacant and unoccupied congregations were submitted and the usual standing committees reappointed, the first mentioned being:

Missions—Revs. Hunter, Wilson, Crozier, with representative elders.
 Missions—Revs. Fowle, McFaul, Hunter, Tait, McClelland, McDonald, Fowle, Smith, Armstrong, Ballantine, and elders.
 Evangelization—Revs. Armstrong, Ballantine and elders.
 Education—Revs. McClelland, Tait, Crozier, and elders.
 Orphans—Revs. Crozier, McFaul, Wilson, and elders.
 Revs. G. G. Hunter, Craig, Ballantyne, and elders.
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A discussion took place in regard to the proposed merger of the Presbyterian and Methodist churches. Addresses on the subject of church work were given by Mr. Madill and Mr. Peters, elder. It was resolved to apply \$200.00 to the H. M. funds for their assistance. A call from Maple Valley was granted to Rev. J. A. McDonald. A call from Rev. Mr. Hunter and Mr. Crozier was granted to give subjects to be held in bounds of Presbytery. Presbytery held regular meetings every two weeks, the next meeting on the second Tuesday of September.

A meeting was held in the evening in the audience chamber. Addresses on the subject of church work were given by Mr. Madill and Mr. Peters, elder. It was resolved to apply \$200.00 to the H. M. funds for their assistance. A call from Rev. J. A. McDonald was granted to give subjects to be held in bounds of Presbytery. Presbytery held regular meetings every two weeks, the next meeting on the second Tuesday of September.

Death Death.

During the storm Monday afternoon, as George Whittaker was making his way to shelter from the rain, he was struck and instantly killed by lightning. The deceased had been plowing in section 11-121-72, for A. Strong. Perceiving the storm approaching he unharnessed his three horses and proceeded to Mr. Crerar's where he was boarding. He was within forty yards of the house when the lightning struck him, killed him instantly, also the horse he was riding and the other along side. The family of Mr. Crerar witnessed the bolt descend with its fatal results. They immediately proceeded to where Mr. Whittaker lay, but life was extinct. The only marks of the deathly messenger was a very slight dislocation on the right side of the neck. The two horses fell at the side of the deceased. Mr. Whittaker was about twenty-three years of age, and unmarried. He came to Edmunds county in 1885, from Plankinton, with his father, Arthur Whittaker and owned a pre-emption on the NW 18-121-72, and a home stead on the NE 30-121-72. The deceased was a young man of exemplary habits and highly respected by all who knew him. His death has cast a gloom over the neighborhood in which he resided. Deceased was born in Perth county, Ontario, Canada, Feb. 10, 1863. He leaves a father (in Edmunds county) and a mother, brother and sister in his native land. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. C. H. Conway, pastor of the M. E. Church, at the residence of his father in 121-72, near where he was buried. The very large attendance at the funeral evinced the high esteem in which the deceased was held. —Roscoe Magnet.
