Father Chiquy is lecturing in the

enlarged and re-painted.

The Hanover "Post" is advocating in-

The establishment of an organ factory
is being agitated in Durham.

Owen Sound on the 4th October.

that town on Tuesday, the 14th Sept.

Fourteen spring chickens were stolen
from Capt. Moodie's stable recently, in
Durham.

A by-law to provide for a new High
School in Mt. Forest was voted and
carried recently.

Henry Johnston, of Artemesia, threshed
his barley, and has a yield of fifty
bushels per acre.

J. W. Frost, Esq., of Owen Sound, has
been elected High Councillor of the
Foresters of Ontario.

Mr. Geo. S. Birch, a clerk in Ireland's
store, Owen Sound, died suddenly of
heart disease on Friday last.

At the Grimsby camp grounds a week
ago last Sunday, Dr. Talmage preached
to an audience of 10,000 people.

It is rumored that the C. P. R. will
secure the contract for carrying the
mails between England and Halifax.

A rich and extensive iron mine has
been discovered about 30 miles south-
west of the C. P. R., near Fort William.

The first barley of the season on the
Shelburne market last week was a fine
sample, and was sold at 55 cents per
bushel.

ed repairs during the holidays.

the bag. The story was not credited,
and warrant was issued and placed in

for execution. The officer arrested the
boy and succeeded in eliciting a full con-

reached Clarksburg the same afternoon,
had the lad examined before Jos. Rorke,

The Methodist Parliament.
MEETING OF THE GENERAL CONFERENCE AT
METROPOLITAN CHURCH TORONTO.

The General Conference which assembled
at the Metropolitan Church yesterday, is the
supreme governing body of Methodism in
Canada. It is composed of an equal number
of ministers and layman, who are elected
by their respective annual conferences.
There are ten conferences in which there are
over 1800 ministers. As one minister in
ten is elected, the clerical representation is
180, and including laymen the total number
of delegates is 360. The General Conference
meets only once in four years, and its
session lasts a fortnight or three weeks.
Its membership includes all the leading
divisions of the Church and many men
prominent in business, professional and
political circles, forming a highly intellectual
and able body.
