A Home-Made Telepone.

To make a serviceable telephone, from one farm house tolanother, only requires enough wire and two cigar boxes. First select your boxes, and make a hole about half an inch in diameter in the centre of the bottom of each, and then place one in each of the houses you wish | Dr. Fowler's Extract of Wild Strawberry. to connect; then get five pounds of common iron stove pipe wire; make a loop in one end and put it through a hole in your cigar box and fasten at with a nail; then draw it tight to the other box, supporting it when necessary with a stout cord.
