## A Home-Made Telephone.

To make a serviceable telephone, from one farm house to another, only requires enough wire and two cigar boxes. First select your boxes, and make a hole about half an inch in diameter in the centre of the bottom of each, and then place one in each of the houses you wish to connect; then get five pounds of common iron stove pipe wire; make a loop in one end and put it through a hole in your cigar box and fasten it with a nail; then draw it tight to the other box, supporting it when necessary with a stout cord. You can easily run your line into the house by boring a hole through the glass. Support your boxes with slats nailed across the window, and your telephone is complete. The writer has one, two hundred yards long and cost 45 cents that will carry music when the organ is playing thirty feet away in another room.—[Rural Canadian.]
