The board of Arbitrators appointed by the county council of Grey, to sit upon the question of the petition of the ratepayers of a portion of School Section No. 5, Artemesia, to have a portion of said section around Flesherton Station formed into a school section by itself, met on Saturday last in the Town Hall at Flesherton, and after a patient and most careful hearing of all the parties on both sides of the question: decided unanimously that the petition presented to the township council (and now in appeal) should be granted. So the inhabitants of Flesherton Station and neighborhood will soon be blessed with the advantage of a school in their midst.

Harvesting of the unfinished part of it, is slow work now on account of rainy weather, but on the whole crops around here are expected to be above an average in quantity and quality.
