ANCIENT ORDER OF UNITED WORKMEN.—There are over 12,000 members of this Order in Ontario. There was no assessment for the months of August and September. During the last eight months the Order has increased at the rate of three hundred per month in Ontario. The Order at large on 1st September was 167,000. During 1885 the increase was 24,000, and during the eighteen years over \$15,000,000 were paid to widows and orphans of the Order. At last meeting of the Supreme Lodge the Province of Quebec and Manitoba were annexed to the Province of Ontario.

Council met this day pursuant to adjournment, all the members present. The Reeve in the chair. Minutes of last meeting read and confirmed.

Williams—Lamb.—That cheques be issued for the following amounts for work performed in Ward No. 1 viz:
