Editorial Notes.

—Like every other appetite, the greed of money grows by what it feeds upon. Russia is fermentation trouble in Bulgaria, and is at the same time preventing the Bulgarian Government from punishing the rebels. Yet if the Bulgarian Government does not prevent serious rising, Russia will seize the country under the pretext of an occupation, Hungary is in earnest, however, in opposing Russian designs and she may drive the Austrian Empire into action.

SIR JOHN'S VISIT TO OWEN SOUND.

Somewhat or another the veteran Premier appears to possess more magnetism than all our other politicians put together.

The different Stations from Orangeville to Owen Sound were literally packed when the excursion train came along on Monday last. 180 tickets were sold at this station, and other points in proportion. Markdale and Flesherton Brass Bands were on board adding enthusiasm to the occasion.

Sir John stepped out at Markdale Station, while the train was adding another coach, and the throng pressed to have a shake hands with the Premier and were delighted with the unexpected gratification.

After the train moved off he made his way through all the crowded coaches shaking hands with every man woman and child, a circumstance which gratified their curiosity and delighted them above measure.

On arrival at Owen Sound a tremendous concourse of people were at the station; it is said the largest crowd ever seen in the town at once. The streets and houses were profusely decorated with flags and bunting and the procession from Station to the rink, through the principal street, was a dense throng headed with a line of carriages with prominent party men and followed by seven brass bands (two of them Indian) at intervals along the procession, Markdale band and citizens showing to good advantage.

Speech making followed but the rink wouldn't hold half the crowd. We haven't space for a further report.

EDITOR STANDARD:—I am glad you have broken the ice in reference to the butter question. The present season has about closed both for the make and sale of butter, and it is well to have the important question thoroughly ventilated so that there may be on improvement in the way and means of the manufacture and sale of this staple article the coming season.

There is great room for improvement in the manufacture as well as mode of sale.

In the past, farmers have not generally looked upon this branch of farming (at least in this district) of sufficient importance to warrant special attention or the necessary outlay to ensure the desired result, but while giving their best attention to other branches, (chiefly grain raising) the dairy has been allowed to take care of itself. The grain raising question has however proved so unsatisfactory and unprofitable, it becomes

us now to cast about for something less expensive and more remunerative. It will not do to drop the grain altogether, yet we are compelled to pay more attention to stock and dairying, and in doing so, it becomes necessary to carefully consider the whole situation; the kind of stock we have, their food and water, cleanliness of stables, (in winter weather) cool and well ventilated milk houses &c., &c. It is my candid opinion that if a high grade of butter was made, a higher price would be obtained notwithstanding the present unsatisfactory mode of marketing.

I also agree with you Mr. Editor, that creameries will be the first thing to revolutionize the dairy business. The expense of fitting up the way and means to manufacture a real first class article, is to great for every farmer to undertake even they did know how, and besides, it could not be expected that a tub of butter which took say three weeks to make could be as uniform in color taste and general quality as one which is all made from one churning.

The cheese factories have done a good work, but I hold we require the creamers as well, and until we have them, the standard of butter will not be a 1.
