The Assistant County Clerk took the chair, called the Council to order, and asked them to elect a Warden. All the members, not being present, an adjournment was had till 7 p. m.

When the Council met again, Nicholas Read, Esq., Deputy Reeve of St. Vincent, was elected Warden by a practically unanimous vote on the first ballot, and it was immediately made unanimous by a standing vote.

A special committee to consider the question of the Clerkship was appointed, and the Council adjourned till Wednesday.

Mr. John Gale, who for many years has held the position of Assistant County Clerk was unanimously appointed County Clerk at a salary of \$600.

Robert Edge was appointed Auditor on nomination of the Warden, and John Albery on behalf of the Council.

John Rutherford was re-appointed High School Trustee.

John Chisholm and Thos' Gamey were appointed members of a Board of Audit.

Euphrasia Council.

The members elect of the township council of the township of Euphrasia for the year 1887, being Thomas Gilray, Esq., Reeve, Wm. Fawcett, Esq., Deputy-Reeve, James Boyd, James Erskine and Henry Hurd, Esquires, councillors met on Monday, the 17th January 1887, made and subscribed their declarations of qualification and office in due form filed the same with the clerk, and took their seats at the council board.

Minutes of last session of council read and confirmed. W. H. Dodson, on nomination of the Reeve, and J. L. Wilson, on behalf of the council were appointed auditors at a salary of \$12 each and a by-law passed accordingly. Robert Myles was appointed assessor at a salary of \$100 and is to discharge all the duties of said office. Albert G. Paterson, D. R. Ellis and A. T. Buchanan were appointed members of the local board of health.

Dr. Sproule, M. P., was appointed medical health officer. The treasurer was ordered to pay to the proper parties \$2 for each polling place used at the last municipal election, and \$2 for each such polling place used at last legislative election being total of \$4 for each polling place as follows: school house of Union S. Section No. 6, \$4; school house of Union S. Section No. 4, \$4; school house of S. Section No. 14, \$4; school house of S. Section No. 15, \$4; school house of S. Section No. 9, \$4; Orange Hall Kimberley, \$4. The Reeve's order was issued on the treasurer in favor of John Ormsby for \$31.50 to pay men for work performed on 15 and 16 side road on the eighth concession. The treasurer was ordered to pay to Deputy Returning officers for their own services and that of their clerks at last municipal election as follows, viz: Nicholas Hewson, \$6.60; Nathaniel Currey, \$6.60; James Struthers, \$7.10; Daniel Silverthorn, \$6.50; Thomas Ellis, \$6.80; Thomas Abercrombie, \$6.70; William Pringle, \$7.10; and R. Dunlop, clerk, for all services in connection with said election, \$20. The Reeve's order was issued on the treasurer in favor of George Crabtree for \$7, payment for desk for township hall and other fixtures on said hall. Council adjourned until Monday, the 31st January next.
