The Reeve was instructed to examine the state of the culverts on 24 & 25 side line and get repairs made if necessary.—The Reeve and clerk were instructed to memorialize the railway commission on behalf of this Township.

The council made a grant of \$1.00 per week for the remaining part of this year, for the support of W. P. Carson, an indigent and an order issued for \$15.00 of said amount.

Messrs Boyd and Erskine, were appointed to meet the committee of Holland Township to repair Town Line.
