portance to ourselves and breeders in
general. The pedigree of our colt
"Just in Time," has been found fault
with because it does not, as some
of the names of books the
numbers are taken from, and others
said that it is no pedigree be-
cause it is too short,
To those who do not understand it
I wish to say that wherever they find
the name marked, supposing the
number marked, it is taken from the
Canadian S. Book and when marked
is taken from the G. B. & I. S. B.
When not marked in any way should
be looked on as very doubtful or stolen.
Some may wonder what we mean
by a stolen No. we mean just this;
when a horse is properly registered
he gets a certificate with his No. age
& description on, and signed by the
of the Association. There are a
number of horses in the country of the
same name and similar description,
and it is an easy matter for the owner
of an unregistered horse to steal a num-
ber from one of the same name, and
living at a safe distance and very
sneaky, may give the No. of vol. too,
at the bottom of this by referring to the
different volumes means considerable
trouble and expense, but as there is
only one certificate issued for each no.
and the owner of the proper horse
knows it, it is plain to see that the short-
est and cheapest way of testing the
horse one intends using is to see the
certificate and if it is not at hand just
take a guarantee with a penalty
not less than \$50.00 in case the
owner failed to show a genuine certi-
ficate of registration in either the
Canadian, G. B. & I. or American S.
Book (these are the only trustworthy
books in the world) at a proper time,
and now to show that we mean what
we say we agree right here to pay
every patron of "Just in Time" \$50.
We cannot show a genuine certi-
ficate of registration for him in the
Canadian S. Book of Canada.

Let the owner of every honest horse
in this and there will soon be an in-
terest taken in registered (not pedigrees
only) horses that will corner every
foal on the road, and we venture to
say there has been more fraud in con-
nection with the stallion business than
ever there was in all the shoddy cloth
sell in the county.

In regard to pedigree being too
short we have only to say that we did
not think it necessary to trace him
back past the numbered dam's as we
approve him right from the start; and
fancy un-numbered names do not look
well in the pedigree of a horse called
pure bred.

Now sir we are glad to hear that
some are taking an interest in pedigrees
if it is to criticise ours, and we don't
think it will be out of place for us to
give our opinion on the benefits of
breeding from registered stock, espe-
cially horses. A great many has
the idea that registration of their
own stock is something too far away
to be worth bothering with; well it
only requires four straight crosses to
qualify a filly for registration, and
five for a stallion, and is the extra
money paid for the use of a high
priced stallion not to some extent
thrown away if there is not a record
kept of every cross. A five cent book is
all that is required then take the
name of horse, his no. of vol.
recorded in (no. is very little use with-
out vol.) and when mated for second
cross do the same and so on till
fourth is reached and in a wonderful
short time registered fillies will be a
common thing here as well as other
places. But supposing a person never
intends or expects to raise stock eligible
for registration, it pays to keep a record
as above, in a short time there will be
enough heavy horses here to bring in
foreign buyers and the Americans will
be here as they are now in the older
settled parts of Ont. picking up every
likely looking filly for breeding pur-
poses and we think we are safe in say-
ing that they pay from ten to seventy
five per cent more, according to num-
ber of crosses when a straight record
can be given? and there is not an-
other class of horses in the world
that is selling better than heavy Can-
adian fillies.

Then there is another very common
mistake made in regard to imported
horses. Some seem to have the idea
that if a horse is imported he is all
right. We say he is all wrong if not
a registered horse. We believe there
has been more money made by im-
ported mongrels into this country than
ever there was by imported pure bred
horses. Speculators go to the Old
Country and buy up a lot of cheap
horses bring them here and the simple
fact of them being imported secures
sales at enormous profits. We

would like some one that knows more
about it than we do to tell us how
such horses as these that are not and
cannot be registered in any trustwor-
thy book are going to improve our
stock; Is it pure blood that is want-
ed.

As we wish our customers to know
exactly what they are breeding from
we publish the following letter which
will explain why "Just in Time" has
not a no. in the G. B. & I. R. B. as
expected; but it will be noticed that
this will not interfere with the reg-
istering of his stock in any way as no
horse bred in this country can receive
a no. there.

DEAR SIR.—I am favored with yours
of 17th March, and am sorry to have
to dissapoint you, but cannot give you
a certificate such as you desire. You
will require to enter "Just in Time"
either in the American Clydesdale
Stud Book, the secretary for which is
Mr. C. F. Mills, Springfield, Ill. or
the Canadian Clydesdale Stud Book
the secretary for which is Mr. Henry
Wade, Toronto, "Just in Time" can-
not receive a number in the Scotch
Stud Book unless it should be the
case that altho. foaled in Canada his
dam was put to the horse in this
Country.

There is nothing amiss with the
pedigree of "Just in Time" the
only difficulty is that we have a By-
Law that no horse can be numbered
in the Clydesdale Stud Book unless
it be bred in the United Kingdom.

Trusting this explanation will be
satisfactory.
