The experiences of those who get religion are often wild tales of imaginary adventures in Heaven of the lower reigion, and surpass Baron Munchausen for lofty flights of imagination among the improbabilities.

When a camp meeting is in progress the nogroes are in a state of great excitement and flock from miles around the country to hear the preacher's passionate harangue.

When worked up to the highest pitch of religious enthusiasm they are often frantic from excitement and continue in this state until they fall from exhaustion. On awaking from the fainting fit brought on by nervous prostration they relate the wonderful tales of their adventures in supernatural worlds.
