**STATUTES FOR JUSTICES OF THE PEACE.**  
**—Mr. Armstrong,** the Clerk of the Peace, writes to us that he has received for distribution to qualified Justices of the Peace for this County, the Statutes of the last session of the Ontario Legislature, as also the compilation and revision of the Criminal Laws of 1887, to be delivered personally to or upon the written order of the Justices entitled thereto.

We very much regret to say that **Mr. J. W. Ford** has been obliged to make an assignment owing to financial difficulties. Mr. Ford has been in the milling business some 16 years in this place, and a more enterprising, industrious and honorable business man could not be found; yet, owing in the first place to a want of sufficient capital during the recent years when it became necessary to make large expenditures in changing to the roller system in order to keep pace with the age; and then following this three years of low price in wheat, which is a vital point in milling; those together with several severe losses has caused the present difficulty. We trust however that he will be able to make such arrangements as will enable him to resume operations.

The load of grain, mentioned in the Standard some weeks ago brought to market by Samuel Quinton of Euphrasia, being the first on our market for this season and sold to W. J. McFarland for 50 cents per bushel was barley. We omitted giving the kind of grain at the time.

The Roman Catholic picnic, held at Mr. James Quinn's park, in Holland last Thursday, was well patronized; about three hundred were present, all of whom enjoyed themselves well. Had the forenoon been more favorable, no doubt a larger turnout would have been the result. The park was open for pleasure seekers early in the forenoon; and at noon, the bell rang for "All hands and the cook," when a sumptuous repast was partaken of. The chief attraction was the dancing platform, erected for those who wished to exercise their limbs; and the music, consisting of violin and organ, did credit to the executors. The junior foot ball teams of Chatsworth and Markdale respectively played a match game, and after a hot contest, resulted in a tie. The athletic games—running, jumping, throwing sholder-stone, etc., were well contested by the amateurs of that district, for which liberal prizes were given. A large story-cake was competed for by Holland vs. Sullivan; and at the close of the poll the result was, we understand, Holland \$16, Sullivan \$8. A pair of ladies bracelets and a ladies watch chain were canvassed for by the fair sex, and they succeeded in getting a long list of names. We did not hear who were the lucky recipients. A brass band was advertised for the occasion, but we failed to hear or see it. Admittance to the park and table 35c. and luncheon in the evening 10c. extra.
