Mr. R. McKnight.

THE POPULAR REGISTRAR OF GREY COUNTY PORTRAYED IN THE BEETON WORLD.

The Beeton world of recent date contained a remarkable well-executed portrait of Mr. R. McKnight, Grey County Registrar, and the following biographical sketch accompanied the picture: "County Down, Ireland, is his native spot and he first saw light there in 1836. When 10 he came to Canada via New York, and engaged with a captain to go on a whaling expedition to the Polar seas—but he didn't go. He then came to Tossoronto township securing work in a saw mill, and in six months the mill was under his management, continuing so for three years. In 1860 he commenced teaching school in Essa, removing in three years more to Beeton. The old school house which stood until a short time ago on Mr. R. Dunham's farm was the scene of his labors. The farm was then owned by the late Squire Stephens, with whom Mr. McKnight boarded, and the stories he can tell of the old Squire's eccentricities are many and varied. Always fond of "the military" he spent a year in the Toronto military school securing a comission. We next find him engaged in the mercantile business in Markdale, whence he removed to Cookstown, adding a drug business to his general store. Whilst there he was married to Miss McLean, of Elm Grove, and in the spring following his store and dwelling fell a pray to the fire fiend, everything being consumed. Paying up every cent he owed he removed to Meaford embarking in the drug and grocery line. Twice he contested East Grey in the Reform interest for the Commons and also opposed Mr. Creighton in North Grey for the Local, being defeated in the latter by but 59 votes. Shortly after this the Registrarship of Grey became vacant, he was offered the position and he accepted it."

We are glad to be able to announce that very extensive improvements are likely soon to be made in our harbor. On Saturday last Sir George Stephen, President; Mr. Van Horn, Vice President and General Manager; Mr. McKinnon, the newly appointed Assistant Manager of this Division; Mr. Wilson, Superintendent; Mr. Hershberg, Engineer; and other officials of the C. P. R. visited Owen Sound. They were met by Mr. Morrison, the Mayor; Mr. Parker, President Board of Trade; Mr. Kennedy, Chairman Railway Committee, and Mr. Masson, M. P.

It is understood there will be dredged a slip extending into the marsh just north of the present coal docks about 600 feet, having a width of 100 feet and a depth of water of 17 feet. Upon the south side of the slip is to be erected a new elevator, with a capacity of at least 1,000,000 bushels. There are also to be constructed additional docks and warehouses. It is proposed next season to add one or more boats to the C. P. R. line running to Port Arthur, and to establish a line of freight and passenger steamers between here and Chicago and Milwaukee.—[Owen Sound Times.]
