In reference to the Dundalk lock-up the Herald says, "The dimensions of this imposing public building, which is situated on the Gore immediately opposite Hassard's blacksmith shop, are 12x14 feet and 8 feet high, and it is built of solid hemlock boards. It has been suggested that it be put on rollers, so that when a boisterous subject is in durance vile it can be rolled out into the swamp, and the peace of the village be preserved. It is expected prisoners will be allowed to take exercise by walking out among the telegraph poles."

**SEVERE STABBING AFFRAY.**—A serious stabbing affray occurred in the confectionery store kept by Glennie Heans, on Wednesday evening of last week. It is the custom of the boys of the village to congregate in this store, and on the evening in question a dispute arose between Thomas Woodyard and James Irwin, lads about 16 years of age, and a quarrel followed. Irwin struck and kicked Woodyard, who drew a knife and struck at him. Irwin put up his hand to ward off the blow and the blade of the knife was thrust through his hand inflicting an ugly and dangerous wound. Irwin was immediately taken to Dr. Griffin's office where the hand was dressed. Woodyard was arrested early Thursday morning by constable Glazier and appeared before the Magistrate at 11 o'clock. He pleaded not guilty, but the evidence proved conclusively that he was guilty, and he was consequently sent to Owen Sound to stand his trial at the next session of the County Court. Irwin will lose the use of his hand for several months.—[Dundalk Herald].

**ACCIDENT AT A FUNERAL.**—An accident which might have terminated with serious results occurred on the 24th line, St. Vincent, near Mr. Arch. Camahan's place, on Friday of last week, when the funeral of the late Joseph Mathieson of Epping, Euphrasia township, was passing that point on the road. There is a small grade on the road fronting the place mentioned and when the rig in which was seated Mr. and Mrs. Mathieson, passengers of the deceased, two brothers and a brother's wife was going down the grade the breast strap of one of the horses broke, startling the horses which made off and the occupants of the rig were thrown out on the road. Mrs. Gilbert Mathieson, the mother, sustained severe injuries, while one of the sons was also hurt some. The remaining unconscious for a short time after the accident. The rig was taken up considerably, and for a short time the excitement was intense. Another rig was provided for the mourners and the cortege moved to Meaford cemetery where the remains were interred.—[Meaford Herald].
