The County Council met in the Council Chamber, at 2 p. m., Jan. 18, 1888, pursuant to adjournment from last evening. Present all the members of the council. Warden in the chair, Roll called. Minutes of yesterday read and confirmed. Moved by Mr. McArthur, seconded by Mr. Boland, that report No. 1 of the County Property Committee as awarded be adopted and engrossed in the minutes.—Carried.

On motion made and seconded the Council went into Committee of the whole on report No. 1 of Communications and Memorials, Mr. Caulfield in the chair. Committee rose and reported report as amended in Committee of the whole.

Moved by Mr. Rogers, seconded by Mr. Fox, that report No. 1 of Communications and Memorials as amended in Committee of the whole be adopted and engrossed in the minutes.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Gilray, seconded by Mr. McAuslin, that report of Special Committee of Treasures securities be adopted and engrossed on the minutes.—Carried.

On motion made and seconded the Council went into committee of the whole of By-law No. 368, Mr. Moffat in the chair.

Euphrasia Council.

The members elect of the Township council of the Township of Euphrasia for the year 1888 being—Thomas Gilray, Esq., Reeve; Peter McAuslan, Esq., Deputy Reeve; James Boyd, James Erskine and Wm. Stewart, Esquires, Councillors.—Said members elect having assembled at the Township hall, Rocklyn, at 11 o'clock a. m. on Monday the 16th January, 1888, made and subscribed their declarations of qualification and office, took their seats at the council board.

Minutes of last session of council read and confirmed.  
W. H. Dodson, on nomination of the Reeve, and J. L. Wilson, on behalf of the council were appointed Auditors at a salary of \$12 each, and a By-law passed accordingly.

The Reeve and Deputy Reeve were appointed to enquire into the Validity of the Treasurers Securities as required by Statute.  
Albert C. Paterson, Alex. Erskine and Charles Devitt, Esquires, were appointed members of the local board of health, to act in conjunction with the Reeve and Clerk, and a By-law passed confirming said appointment.

Mr. Stuart was authorized to get a culvert built on G & 7 side road in concession 3, and sell cedar logs.  
\$2.00 charged in error to John McKeen in 1886, and \$1.46 taxes charged to Robert Robinson, (but not collected on account of affliction and indigence) were refunded to the collector as he paid these amounts in full to the Treasurer when settling up his Roll.—The Treasurer was instructed to remit to J. Rutherford \$18 65 Stationary.—And to pay to Deputy Returning Officers for their services and that of their poll Clerks, (and in one case a constable) at last Municipal Election as follows, viz:

J. Struthers, Esq., \$7.10.  
Nathaniel Curry, \$6.60.  
R. H. Stinson, \$7.90.  
Alexander Hall, \$7.10.  
Thomas Ellis, \$6.80.

And pay for the use of polling places at last Municipal Election as follows, viz: Union S. S. No. 6, \$2.00. School Section, No. 15, \$2.00. School Section No. 9, \$2.00. Mr. Boyd's House, \$2.00. Orange Hall, Kimberly, \$2.00. And to pay to R. Dunlop, Clerk, \$20.00 total services in connection with Election.

The Treasurer was ordered to remit to J. Farewell \$14.00 amount of his account rendered for printing up to end of 1887.  
The Reeves orders were issued on the Treasurer to pay as follows, viz: George Graham, \$6.19, plank for culverts. John Sewell, \$25.00 part of contract. George Smith \$6.00, work on 4th line. Joseph Manary, \$3.46 overpaid on Roll. James Clugston, \$16.25 work on 18 & 19 side road. Messrs. Creasor & Morrison, \$5.00 Legal Advice.

Council adjourned until Monday 30th inst.
