

Choice Farm for Sale.

The new machine just built by the Rotary Steam Snow Shovel Company of Toronto was tried last Thursday on the Northern Railway. For four days the line had been blocked with snow between Beeton and Allendale, a distance of 23 miles, the drifts varying from 4 to 10 feet in depth. The plow occupying 12 hours, working time, in clearing the road. It takes three engines to push the plow, which consists of a frame on wheels carrying 600 h. p. engines to drive a rotary shovel that gathers the snow and throws it from 30 to 200 feet away from the track. It is, in a word, a snow excavator. One of these machines will clear 100 miles in a few hours, no matter how heavy the fall. The invention is a Canadian one; 11 of them are now working in the States and giving great satisfaction. The proprietors claim that once these machines are introduced a snow blockade on a railway track is a thing of the


