Dissemination of Poison by Water.

When a mass of organic matter charged with zymotic particles is mixed with water and washed out of a house, the water will carry the poison with it wherever it may chance to flow or trickle -to watercourse, or any other source of drinking-water-in fact. the dissemination is as perfectly and thoroughly done as if dissemination of poison was the main object in view. When dealing with organic matter impregnated with zymotic poisons, mere dilution with water increases rather than diminishes the danger. As long as the poisonous organic refuse is concentrated, its repellent qualities are such that there is little chance of its gaining access to the human body. The microbes contained in it are theoretically capable of infecting an almost infinite quantity of water, and this large quantity of water masks the repellent qualities of the stuff, and thus the danger of infection is greatly increased The dissemination of poison by water is one of which the people of the old country have room for doubt water has been the great
