TOWN FATHERS. As may be seen by Council report in another column our city Fathers have got down to business. We compliment them, as also our citizens, in the wise selection of officers they have made.

TORONTO EXHIBITION. The Industrial Fair for the present year is to be held at Toronto from the 10th to the 22nd of September next. The directors and officials are energetically pushing forward their preparations to make it sustain the grand reputation it has already secured.

The Canadian Pacific Railway has ordered 1,000 new box cars from Crosson, of Cobourg, and 1500 from Montreal. Two hundred locomotives are also to be turned out by the end of the year.

Rev Lyman Abbott, temporary pastor of Plymouth church, Brooklyn, has been formally called to the permanent pastorate as successor to the late Henry Ward Beecher, and will accept.

The temperance question is rapidly coming to the front, and nothing can for any great length of time, hinder its onward movement. The attention the subject is receiving from both churches and state makes it plain that decisive action cannot be long delayed.—Toronto News.

The amendments to the laws to libel introduced in the House of Commons are in the right direction, and go some distance towards placing publishers on a fair footing. They grant in an apparently effective shape the principal reforms asked for by the Canadian Press Association.

The exports of potatoes from Canada during the last fiscal year were in round numbers 1,500,000 bushels of which 1, 276,000 bushels went to the United States at an average price of 40 to 50 cents a bushel. More than half of the entire lot was shipped from Prince Edward Island, and when it is remembered that the United States duty on potatoes is fifteen cents per bushel it is easily seen why the Islanders are so strongly in favor of reciprocity treaty.

How often have we seen feather beds and pillows put into the sunshine to improve the lightness and elasticity of the feathers, as it supposed? The effect seems to be however, quite the contrary, for the sun draws the oil out of the feathers, making them soggy, so that they mat together. Hence it is said that a bed put out in the sun will soon lose any lightness it may possess, and become hard and empty. The best way is to shake up the bed well, open the window and let it stand an hour for an airing.

Montreal Witness.) The Methodist and Presbyterian churches are taking practical steps for a territorial division between them of those sections of country which are so sparsely settled as not to be able to sustain churches of both denominations. A better monument to real Christianity could not be set up than a Methodist church with Presbyterian sanction or a Presbyterian church with Methodist sanction, unless some kind of a union church could be devised for such regions under which a Presbyterian minority would not think they were a Methodist church and a Methodist minority would not feel that they were in a Presbyterian church. So long as it is found impossible that both should be one there will be calling in the working out of the details of such a scheme as this, for the very utmost stretch of Christian charity—members of each body of Christians doing their best to carry out that christian precept of esteeming others better than themselves, while at the same time, by their humility, throwing as little difficulty as possible in the way of their neighbors doing likewise. The successful carrying out of this scheme will be the triumph of Christian brotherly kindness.

BISHOP LYNCH DEAD.

The Ven. Archbishop John Joseph Lynch, Archbishop of Toronto, died at St. John's Grove, the archiepiscopal residence, on St. Lawrence-street, at 1 o'clock, last Saturday morning. His age was 72. He was sick but a very few days, and his illness was known, after a brief illness only to the attaches of the palace, his physicians and the clergy. His death therefore will be a great shock to the entire Dominion.

The history of His Grace's illness was very much like that of the Hon. Thomas White. Thursday morning he returned from St. Catharines feeling unwell. On the train en route to the city he was seized with cholera, accompanied by copious attacks vomiting. Arriving at the Grove he was utterly prostrated. Subsequent inflammation of the lungs set in, in spite of all that the physical could do, His Grace passed peacefully away at the hour named. He was the full possession of his faculties to the moment of his dissolution. The funeral took place on Monday evening and was the largest witnessed in Toronto.

A BIOGRAPHY OF HIS GRACE.

Archbishop Lynch was born in the neighborhood of the market of Clones, in the County of Monaghan, in the diocese of Clogher, Ireland, on the 5th of February, 1816. He was about 2 years of age when his parents removed to Lucan, a village situated a few miles west of Dublin, here the future Archbishop grew to manhood. From his earliest years he had been intended for the priesthood, and when he was about 16 years of age he commenced his classical studies under the private tuition of B. A. of Trinity College, Dublin, made rapid progress, and soon became an excellent classical scholar. He then entered a college of the Carmelites, near Clondalkin, where he spent twelve industrious months. In 1835 he entered St. Vincent's Castleknock. At this establishment he continued his classical studies, much profit and also made great progress in rhetoric, natural philosophy and metaphysics. He rose to the position of a Superior long before the date at which such a dignity would ordinarily have been conferred upon him. In 1839 he entered the novitiate of the Congregation of the mission of St. Lazarus, Paris, where he pursued his study of theology. In 1841 he was upon him the vows of the order in the next year received ordination at the hands of Monseigneur de Clugny known as "The Martyr of the 14th of July"—in the church of St. Sulpice. He offered to go out on a mission to China. Meantime he returned to Ireland, and in 1843 was ordained a deacon and priest at Maynooth by the then archbishop of Dublin. He celebrated his first mass in the chapel of St. Vincent's College, which he went on missions to parts of Ireland. In 1846 he was appointed Superior of the Barrow Perry County Missouri. For years he was engaged on missions in the Western States. In 1848 on a special mission to Rouen, which occasion he had a conference with the Pope and from him many marks of favor. Lynch returned from Rouen during which year, in response to the solicitation of the Bishop of the diocese, he founded a house of his order. He first laid the foundation of a preparatory school at Buffalo, but afterwards returned to Niagara. The institution was named by the name of the Seminary of the Angels. Father Lynch exertions on behalf of this made him known to the hierarchy of the Catholic Church. In 1859 he was appointed coadjutor of the Bishop of Toronto. He was consecrated Bishop of St. Michael's, Toronto, Nov. 20, 1860. During the following year Charbonnel having resigned, Lynch succeeded him in the see. In 1862 he was elected to the see of Toronto. He was known as the "Canon of the Japanese Martyrs," and was named Prelate Assistant of the Holy Throne. In 1869-70 he was sent to the Vatican Council, and was appointed one of the plenipotentiaries of the Holy See. He made a special appeal for the rights of the Holy See, and made a special appeal for the rights of the Holy See. He was divided, and
