CHBISHOP LYNCH DEAD. The Venerable Prelate, Demise.

John Joseph Lynch, Archbishop Coronto, died at St. John's Groy he archiepiscopal residence, on She enrne-street, at 1 o'clock, last Satu His age was 72. H his illness was known, after rief illness only to the attaches of t relace, his physicians and the clerg His death therefore will be a gre shock to the entire Dominion.

The history of His Grace's illne was very much like that of the la Hon. Thomas White. Thursday er mng he returned from St. Catharin feeling unwell. On the train en ro to the city he was seized with chi accompanied by copious attacks vomiting. Arriving at the Grove was utterly prostrated. Subsquer inflammation of the lungs set in, in spite of all that the physici could do, His Grace passed peacef away at the hour named. He was the full possession of his faculties to the moment of his dissolution.

The funeral took place on Mon evening and was the largest witnessed in Toronto. A BIOGRAPHY OF HIS GRACE, Archibishop Lynch was born in neighboringhood of the market t of Clones, in the County of Mon: an, in the diocese of Clogher, Irel on the 5th of February, 1861. W he was about 2 years of age his ents removed to Lucan, a village nated a few miles west of Dublin, here the future Archbishop grew to manhood. From his earliest y he had been intended for the pr hood, and when he was about 16 y of age he commenced his clas studies under the private tuition B.
