TELEGRAPHIC NEWS NOTES.

North-west Immigration.
PORT ARTHUR, June 1.—During the month of May 3,900 immigrants passed here for the North West.
The Bonus Granted.
SIMCOE, Ont., June 1.—The by-law granting a bonus of \$5,000 to aid the South Norfolk Railroad was carried to-day by a majority of 215.

Jay Gould Serious Ill.
St. Louis, June 1.—From general information received here to night by the editor of the Republican, it is learned that Jay Gould is very seriously ill in his private car near Kansas City. No further particulars have been received yet.

The Industrial Exhibition.

Disobeyed Orders and Were Drowned.
MACKER'S STATION, Ont., June 2.—Six men in the employ of Pierce & Co., of Ottawa, attempted to run the rapids at Mille-Roches, at the head of Lake Traverse on the Pettawawa river, against the orders of their foreman. The boat swung around in the current and upset, drowning Cleophas Theriat, of Point Claire, Hyacinthe Walle, of Buckingham, and Denis Beaudry, of Papineauville. The bodies had not been recovered when the messenger left the place of the accident.

Death of a Bicyclist.
OTTAWA, June 1.—Mr. Henry Knowles, son of Mr. J. Knowles, agent of the Northern and North-western railway at Brantford, one of the visiting bicyclists who came to the city to attend the bicycle tournament on the 24th of May, died this afternoon at the Grand Union hotel of inflammation of the bowels. The deceased was ruptured at the amateur athletic grounds by falling from his bicycle in a race. He was taken to the Grand Union, where his injuries developed into conditions that resulted fatally. The remains were forwarded to Brantford by to-nights train.

Death of T. M. Nairn, M. P. P.
ST. THOMAS, June 1.—The death of Thos. M. Nairn, member for East Elgin in the Ontario Legislature, occurred at his residence in Aylmer this morning. A few weeks ago the deceased was taken ill and for some days grave fears were entertained for his recovery. During the last few days, however, Mr. Nairn had improved so rapidly that his friends considered it only a matter of a few weeks when he would be among them again. This morning he got out of bed as usual and dressed himself, feeling much stronger. He had been up only a few minutes when he complained of feeling faint, and lying down again expired almost at once. Although suffering from other ailments, it was thought that heart disease was the ultimate cause of his death.

Suicide at Ingersoll.
INGERSOLL, June 3.—A sad case of suicide occurred here on Friday night or Saturday morning. Miss Leigh, who has had a fancy store for several years here, was found dead in bed on Saturday morning at the residence of Mr. John Lee, where she had been a guest over night. Nothing peculiar in her manner was noticed by Mr. or Mrs. Lee, who were conversing with her at a late hour Friday night. When found she was lying with her face buried in her hands and a bottle of chloroform was standing on the table in the room. No possible reason can be assigned for her rash act, as her business was in a flourishing condition; but for the past few days she has been suffering from melancholy for some cause or other.

Winnipeg "Call" Office Destroyed.
WINNIPEG, June 3.—The *Morning Call* office was destroyed by fire this morning at 1.30, and in two hours was a complete mass of ruins. Nothing whatever was saved except the books and mailing lists. The loss is very heavy, between \$35,000 and \$40,000. Insurance \$21,000, in the following companies: City of London, \$7,000; National, \$2,500; Imperial, \$2,000; Caledonian, \$1,900; Aetna, of Hartford, Glasgow and London, and Canadian, \$1,000 each; Western and North British, \$2,000 each; North-West, \$1,250, and some smaller sums. Besides this the building, which was owned by MacArthur & Allan, was insured for \$5,000. The origin of the fire is a mystery, there having been no fire in the office since Saturday noon. Incendiarism is suspected, but no suspicion of the guilty parties exists.

The Free Press, adjoining on the west, had a narrow escape, and Taylor's book bindery and other wooden buildings which surrounded the Call office were not even scorched, owing to the efficiency of the fire brigade. Although not a pound of type was saved the *Call* will issue to-morrow as usual, the *Free Press, Sun* and *Le Manitoba* having generously furnished it with the necessary facilities.

Natural Gas at Collingwood.
COLLINGWOOD, June 1.—The shaft sunk by the Collingwood Rock Well Co. developed a flow of gas at about 150 feet three weeks ago. The boring was continued to a depth of over 500 feet without increasing the flow, though a strong mineral spring was developed. It was then determined by the directors to torpedo the well in the hopes of opening the gas vein, which it was believed the pressure of water from below had almost closed. Accordingly two torpedoes were discharged this afternoon at 165 and 145 feet. The result justified the most sanguine expectations of the company, for after the second explosion a very strong and steady flow of gas came with a roar which can be heard for a considerable distance from the well. The gas is increasing in volume and causes the water through which it passes to boil furiously. A long pipe was attached to the outlet and the gas lit this afternoon. The result was a fierce and powerful flame, giving out a strong heat. The company's stock has gone away up and there is great excitement in town for there is no doubt the gas well is a most valuable property. The company has commenced another shaft in the West Ward, where indications of gas have already been found, and if it is as successful as the present one there is little doubt but a great impetus will be given to manufacturing, as cheap fuel will be furnished to those investing capital. It is quite probable that iron smelting may be one of the chief industries which this wonderful flow will bring into life.

EXCHANGE CLIPPINGS.

At the last meeting of the official Board of the Methodist church a resolution was passed recommending that a new church be built on the west side of the river, and another congregation formed. The church at the present time seats about twelve hundred, but on many occasions during the past few years it has been over-crowded. The new church on the west side will be a great accommodation to very many of the members and adherents of the church living in that part of the town and we trust it may be as well attended as the old one.—Owen Sound Advertiser.

The programme of sports and games, at Holland Centre, on the 24th, was carried out to the letter. There was a good crowd in attendance, a good time for all and everybody went away satisfied. The committee was composed of gentlemen, acted like gentlemen, were treated like gentlemen and must have been satisfied with themselves. The enterprised displayed speaks volumes for the citizens of the place, and another year they can count on a much bigger crowd patronizing their holiday sports.—Chatsworth News.

The first butter was made in the Chesley Creamery on Tuesday last. Many of our citizens took advantage of the occasion to have a great blow out on butter-milk. Mr. Walden, the gentleman in charge, very thoughtfully placed in a convenient place, a large pan full of the delectable liquid, which he replenished from time to time, as required. Everybody praised the buttermilk, and the machinery and the building and all the surroundings.—Chesley Enterprise.

Mr. George Harcourt for many years baggageman on the T. G. & E. S. branch of the C. P. R., and a favorite with everybody on and off of the road between Owen Sound and Toronto, has quit railroading and started a steam laundry in Owen Sound. While in town last week we dropped in to see our genial friend, who was up to the shoulders in suds and his eyes in business, nevertheless he found time to show us through the establishment and let us see the machinery in operation. The work is rapidly and excellently done on the most improved machinery, and at reasonable cost. Owen Sound should give Mr. Harcourt their undivided support, as he is a worthy citizen in every respect, and besides every labor-employing enterprise that is started and prospers at the county seat adds one more feather to the cap of that prosperous, picturesque and much envied city of the near future.—Chatsworth News.

ACCIDENT.—A young man by the name of Thos. Gault, residing near Wolsley, Township of Keppel, while walking through the field on Sunday last, accidentally stumbled and falling to the ground on his left arm dislocated the wrist also breaking the arm between that joint and the elbow. He was brought to the village Sunday night and had the fracture reduced by Dr. Fisher.—Warton Echo.

Ex Hotel Keeper King late of the Commercial went out to Walkerton last Tuesday and while there, was arrested for non-payment of a Scotch Act fine. He sent a telegram to Mr. John Henry to go to his relief. King whacked up \$45 in cash, and Mr. Henry became surety for the remainder. King was then allowed his liberty.—Chesley Enterprise.

Sullivan—Boyce—That the Reeve be instructed to obtain a written legal opinion relative to the responsibility of Treasurer when placing township monies in the bank without the sanction of this council.—Carried.

Williams—Boyce—That the Reeve and Clerk be a committee to confer with a committee from the Village of Markdale, for the purpose of adjusting the financial matters between the two corporations.—Carried.

McMillan—Boyce—That the Reeve, Mr. Williams and the mover be a committee to ascertain the best method of removing a jamb from the Saugeen river, on lot 41, con. 2, N. D. R., and report at next meeting of council.—Carried.

By-law 259, dividing township into polling subdivisions, and By-law 260, appointing township officers, was passed and ordered to be engrossed in by-law book.
