WIRE FENCES.

Wove-wire fences for village, as well as farm garden and lawn purposes are perhaps the most economical fence extant. They are cheap and durable, and with a little extra expense can be made quite ornamental. They are particularly valuable in winter season by allowing the snow to pass through and thus saving the drifts which usually lodge behind fences of other material. Sidewalks can be kept clear of snow easily where this kind of fence is. The wire also makes excellent gates, very light and durable. The cost of a wire fence is from \$1 a rod up according to finish. Several pieces may be seen in Markdale, the last erected being built by Pete Duff for Mrs. Noble on Elizabeth street.

The constituency of North York loses its representative in the Local Legislature, and the Reform party gets together, picks out one of the soundest Temperance men of the County, Mr. J. E. Who May Sell Drugs, Poisons, &c.

SEE THE PHARMACY ACT OF 1871.

Sec. 1 provides that it shall be unlawful for any person to sell or keep open shop for retailing, dispensing or compounding poisons, or to sell or attempt to sell certain drugs, &c., unless properly or legally qualified therefor.

Sec. 8 provides how poisonous drugs must be marked, &c.

Secs. 20, 21, 22 and 28 provides, who alone may sell or keep for sale certain poisonous articles mentioned in said Act.

Secs. 23 and 25 provides, the penalties that shall be inflicted for violation of said Act; while sec. 27 provides, that no person selling articles in violation of the provisions of this Act shall recover any charges in respect thereof in any court of law or equity.

Canada's New Party.

THE PLATFORM—AN ADDRESS TO THE PEOPLE OF THE DOMINION.

The Executive Committee of what is known as the New or Prohibition Party, which was organized at Toronto March 21, has issued an address to the people. The flag it has adopted is the Union Jack, flanked with the arms of Canada, and inscribed "For God and Our Country." The party platform is as follows:—

Righteousness and truth in public affairs as well as in private business and no compromise with wrong.

Equal rights for all creeds, classes and nationalities, but exclusive privileges to none.

A national sentiment, a national literature, and in all matters of public policy—our country first.

The prompt and absolute prohibition of the liquor traffic, and the honest and vigorous enforcement of all laws for the repression of vice and intemperance.

Retrenchment and economy in public expenditure, with the view of reducing our enormous national debt.

Manhood suffrage, with an educational qualification; that is, a vote every freeman of legal age who can read and write.

The extension of the franchise to women.

An elective senate. Civil service reform.

The address points out the inefficiency of the two great political parties to promptly deal with these questions, and maintains that the remedy consists in substituting a reformed principle for a reign of corruption.

For such a movement the hour is regarded as propitious. The signs of times point to the speedy disintegration of the old parties and the formation of new alliances around the issues. It is claimed that the general adoption of the platform will produce an entire revolution of political methods and aims. The address continues:

In framing the platform which is now submitted, two objects were in view: First, to ground the party on principles that would afford no standing room for crooked methods of selfish aims; and, second, to deal only with those specific questions which most directly touch the welfare of the people at the present time.

It is for this reason that the prohibition of the liquor traffic holds a foremost place. Other questions will arise from time to time, and can be dealt with on their merits, but if the reform demanded by this platform can be accomplished, the country can well wait a while for the settlement of less important issues.

NEWSPAPER ADVERTISING.—A meeting of the Canadian Association held at Toronto last week, the commercial advertising reported that they "place at the head of the list newspapers advertising as the most effective and profitable." This theory is becoming generally the accepted one.

Although fence advertising may be deemed profitable, and other kinds of advertising, there is nothing that catches the public eye, and no place in the advertising world where it will be read and show as many readers as the columns of a newspaper.
