**The Montreal Convention.**

The Dominion Prohibition Conven-  
 tion, to be held at Montreal on July  
 3rd, 4th and 5th, will be a gathering  
 of remarkable interest. It will be the  
 first national Canadian conference of  
 delegated Prohibitionists. The great  
 meeting at Montreal in 1875, out of  
 which came the Dominion Alliance  
 and the Scott Act, was simply a mass  
 convention of active Temperance  
 workers. In the coming meeting every  
 delegate will represent a constituency  
 of Prohibitionists anxiously waiting  
 the decision of their leaders and the  
 call to arms for further conflict.

The convention has been called by  
 the Dominion Alliance, but it will be  
 thoroughly independent when it meets,  
 and will organize and control itself.  
 Every Local Temperance organization,  
 every Lodge, Division, Council, Union,  
 Club, Church Society, or any such in-  
 stitution is invited to send a delegate  
 for each fifty of its membership, any  
 number not being a complete fifty to  
 count as fifty for the purpose of repre-  
 sentation. Every Provincial Tem-  
 perance organization is invited to  
 send its Executive Committee or an  
 equal number of representatives. Every  
 Provincial Branch of the Alliance  
 is to send ten, and every County  
 Alliance or Scott Act Association is  
 entitled to five.

The principal Railway and Steam-  
 boat lines are acting very liberally to-  
 wards the Convention. The Grand  
 Trunk and Canadian Pacific Railways  
 and Richelieu Steamboat Company  
 will issue return tickets to Montreal,  
 for a single fare, to all persons apply-  
 ing. Tickets will be issued on this  
 plan from Saturday, June 30th, up to  
 Tuesday, July 3rd, and will be good  
 for return passage up to Saturday,  
 July 7th. The Intercolonial Railway  
 will sell single fare tickets to Montreal  
 at usual rates and will issue at Mon-  
 treal return tickets FREE, on presenta-  
 tion of a certificate signed by the  
 Secretary of the Convention. It will  
 be seen that all who attend the Con-  
 vention (which will be open to the  
 public, whether delegates or not, may  
 avail themselves of these reduced  
 fares.

The meetings of the Convention  
 proper will be held in the Victoria  
 Hall, Armory on Cathcart Street. On  
 Sunday evening, July 1st, there will  
 be held a great Gospel Temperance  
 meeting at some central point; on  
 Monday, 2nd, there will be an excu-  
 sion to Myauk, and a Prohibition pic-

nic there: on Tuesday evening, 3rd, a  
 monster Prohibition mass meeting will  
 be addressed by the foremost moral  
 reform workers of Canada.

Already there is being manifested  
 everywhere a deep interest in this Con-  
 vention. Its doings and sayings will  
 be carefully studied by the Tem-  
 perance party, the liquor party and the  
 politicians. It will make history.  
 The Prohibitionists are in earnest.  
 The policy they are advocating must  
 speedily receive the careful attention  
 of statesmen and voters. It is being  
 pressed into active politics with a per-  
 sistence that will not be daunted. It  
 has behind it some of the best brain-  
 power in the land, it has been warmly  
 endorsed by different branches of the  
 Christian Church, and it influences  
 the vote of an important and growing  
 section of the electorate. The Mon-  
 treal meeting will be a gathering of men  
 conscientiously and determinedly in  
 earnest. We trust that in its delibera-  
 tions wise counsels will prevail, and  
 that its results will be for the welfare  
 of our country and the advancement  
 of temperance, which every friend of  
 humanity desires to promote.

**County Council.**

[From the Times.]  
 The County Council of Grey met at  
 the Court House here on Monday even-  
 ing last.

A large number of communications,  
 petitions and accounts were read,  
 which were referred to their respective  
 committees.  
 On motion the name of W. J. Mc-  
 Farland, Reeve of Markdale, was  
 placed on the Finance and County  
 Property committees.  
 Leave being granted, By-law No.  
 369, to assess the different local munici-  
 palities in the county for an equiva-  
 lent equal to the Legislative School  
 grant, for 1888, was introduced and  
 read first and second times.  
 The Council adjourned till 2 p. m.  
 on Tuesday.

**TUESDAY AFTERNOON.**

After the reading of communica-  
 tions, Mr. L. A. Wright, the patentee  
 of Lamont's Road Grader and Level-  
 ler, addressed the Council for a short  
 time respecting the merits of the ma-  
 chine, and invited the Council to an  
 exhibition of its capabilities that after-  
 noon.

On motion of Mr. Read, who spoke  
 a few words in favor of the machine,  
 it was agreed the Council would go in  
 a body after adjournment to see it in  
 operation.

A motion by Mr. Moffatt, that an  
 equivalent be granted those townships  
 comprising the group under By-law  
 174, whose personal property rated at  
 6 per cent., was referred to the Finance  
 committee.

By-law No. 369 was filled up in  
 committee, and finally passed.  
 The Reeve of Glenelg gave notice he  
 would move to-morrow for a grant to  
 erect a hand-rail on the floating bridge  
 over Allen's sink hole.

The Council adjourned till 10 o'clock  
 Wednesday morning.

**WEDNESDAY MORNING.**

A number of communications were  
 read, among which was a petition from  
 the town of Meaford, relative to es-  
 tablishing a High School.

Mr. Lang presented report No. 1 of  
 Finance committee, which, after being  
 considered, was referred back to com-  
 mittee to itemize.

Mr. Moffatt presented report of  
 special committee relative to By-law  
 174, which was referred to Finance  
 committee.

Mr. Gilray read report No. 1 of  
 Education committee which was con-  
 sidered in committee of the whole and  
 adopted without amendment.

The report recommended the report  
 of arbitrators respecting forming a  
 union school section between Bentinck  
 and Sullivan, be filed; that no action  
 be taken respecting memorial from  
 Welland to have School Act amended  
 so as to provide for expenses of hold-  
 ing County promotion examinations;  
 recommending the endorsing of cer-  
 tain resolutions from the Provincial  
 Association of Public and High School  
 Trustees; recommending appointing  
 arbitration respecting school difficulty  
 in Sections 5 and 7 of Euphrasia, in  
 regard to forming a new school sec-  
 tion; also recommending appointment  
 of an arbitration to consider the ex-  
 pediency of forming a Union School  
 Section between east end of Owen  
 Sound and Sydenham.

The Council adjourned till 10 o'clock  
 Thursday morning.

**TELEGRAPHIC NEWS NOTES.**

**Gore Bay the Judicial Seat.**  
 TOBERMORY, Ont., June 22.—The  
 election over the judicial seat for  
 Manitoulin Island resulted in Gore  
 Bay carrying the majority by 175  
 Saturday last.

**The old Grant farm sold.**  
 ST. LOUIS, June 22.—The Old Grant  
 homestead, located four miles from  
 the city limits, on the Gravier road,  
 was sold yesterday by Cunniff and  
 Depew to satisfy a mortgage held by  
 W. H. Vanderbilt. The farm com-  
 sisted of 750 acres, and was owned  
 by Vanderbilt at the time of the  
 Grant and Ward failure. It was  
 bought by J. H. Conn, of this city,  
 for \$70,000. Mr. Conn proposes to  
 make a fine stock farm of it. The  
 farm originally belonged to the  
 family.

**Pleuro-Pneumonia in Sullivan.**  
 TARA, Ont., June 24.—On the farm  
 of Mr. Jesse McInnis, Sullivan Town-  
 ship, Grey County, yesterday after-  
 noon, Dr. F. A. Thomas, veterinarian  
 surgeon, of this village, discovered  
 undoubted contagious pleuro-pneu-  
 monia. The disease made its appear-  
 ance two weeks ago and two valuable  
 cows died without Dr. Thomas being  
 able to satisfactorily diagnose the case.  
 Before these died a third one was  
 taken sick and died yesterday after-  
 noon and a post-mortem examination  
 clearly revealed pleuro-pneumonia  
 of the contagious type. A fourth animal  
 is now under treatment, but is com-  
 pletely isolated, and Dr. Thomas hopes  
 to be able to prevent the disease  
 spreading in the neighborhood. De-  
 pending the year several farmers in  
 and other townships surrounding Tara  
 have lost cattle, Dr. Thomas is con-  
 vinced, from this disease, but the  
 death was attributed to poison or other  
 cause at the time.

**Drowned at Owen Sound.**

OWEN SOUND, June 24.—This after-  
 noon the inhabitants were startled to  
 hear of a fatality which occurred at  
 POSITE Bayview about three o'clock.  
 Two young men have been camping  
 down there for the past three weeks  
 and this afternoon were out for a  
 walk when one of them named Chas. Co-  
 lan caught sight of a fish buoy with  
 line attached and started to pull it  
 up. Just as the net came to hand he  
 overboard and became entangled in  
 the net. His companion seeing this  
 he failed to rise to the surface and  
 reach him with the oar, but could not  
 touch his foot, the water being about  
 25 feet deep, and 500 yards from  
 shore. Finding he could do nothing  
 for him he rowed for assistance, but  
 about an hour elapsed before the boy  
 was recovered and brought home.  
 His friends in Owen Sound, who  
 had occurred has cast quite a gloom  
 over the town as the deceased was  
 favorite with all who knew him.

**The Hired Man Again.**

BARRIS, June 22.—George Stockill  
 was before the police court yesterday  
 on a charge of larceny, having been  
 remanded from Tuesday. The  
 prosecutor is one William Johnston,  
 a farmer of the Township of  
 Tiny, and Stockill was his hired man.  
 It is alleged that he used all his  
 persuasive power to win the effects of  
 Johnston's wife, and it is alleged that  
 the two agreed to go off and live  
 man and wife. About the 25th of  
 February Mrs. Johnston left her  
 and, taking with her a roll of cash  
 and some groceries and various other  
 things, Mr. Stockill aiding in taking  
 the goods away. The agreement  
 seems to have been broken by  
 Mrs. Johnston to go away and Stockill  
 to follow. For some reason or other  
 the hired man failed to perform his  
 part of the contract. The wife  
 came repentant and her husband  
 to Lynden, whether she had had  
 taken her back to her home. In  
 evidence she confessed to unlawfully  
 to her husband in her relations with  
 Stockill. Stockill was sent up for  
 trial on the charge of larceny, but  
 admitted to bail in the sum of \$500  
 with sureties in \$800 each. He  
 seeking to elope with the hired  
 Mrs. Johnston left two interesting  
 children for her husband to rear.
