Our streets were almost deserted Monday afternoon (Dominion) and the busy hum of industry characteristic of this thriving had ceased for a while, the citizens having hied themselves to the neighboring village to take part in the sports and games there, that place being this year as the general rendezvous for the surrounding district who celebrate the anniversary of the Confederation. Bills had been passed weeks previously announcing very attractive programme of amusements, that raised expectations.
