 place. The new man is being well
 received.

Standard Correspondence.
 Mrs. Grier is building an addition
 to her store for more conveniences;
 when finished, will make the place
 have a grand and different appearance
 from the present way her store is.
 Mr. Lamont, proprietor of the Crown
 Hotel, is having a large addition built
 to his hotel for the purpose of having
 more bedroom accommodation for the
 use and benefit of the travelling
 community. When this additional im-
 provement is finished it will make the
 Crown Hotel equal with any other
 first class house in this part of the
 country. Mr. and Mrs. Lamont both
 being kind, sensible and obliging no
 doubt but they will be well patronized
 and get a large call from the travellers.
 The stone work of the Presbyterian
 church is finished. The sills and
 corner stones are all dressed by Mr.
 Laidlaw, stonecutter, Durham, a prac-
 tical good hand, well experienced in
 his trade. We suppose he is the oldest
 mason in this county. His work here
 will show his skill and taste. We under-
 stand that the foundation—or rather
 the corner stone—will be laid on Tues-
 day, the 24th inst. We did not hear
 who is to get the honor of laying it,
 but we suppose the parties in power
 have a favorite person appointed or in
 view for the honorable job.

Priceville, by all appearance, re-
 quires large church accommodations.
 Any one being here last Sabbath could
 not help remarking that this place is
 great for church-going people. Early
 in the morning some were seen wind-
 ing their way to their respective places
 of worship. They kept coming from
 half-past ten until eleven when the
 streets were crowded. The Gaelic
 speaking people belonging to the Pres-
 byterian church and the Roman Catho-
 lic congregation going in at the same
 hour, then coming out again at half-
 past twelve and the English speaking
 Presbyterians going in the three con-
 gregations were mixed together on the
 front street and you could not tell the
 difference between any of them. Again
 when the Baptist church was going in
 the English Presbyterians were com-
 ing out which caused another throng
 and mixture of people. In the evening
 the Methodist church meets and is
 well attended; the church is full every
 evening, and comes out at 8 o'clock.
 A stranger may well say it's good to
 be here enjoying such blessed privi-
 leges of the sanctity of the Sabbath day.

Our fair was only fairly well attend-
 ed this week. Cattle in general are
 poor on account of the pasture being
 poor. The few milch cows that there
 was brought good prices. Mr. James
 Gilhes, from the south-east corner of
 the first ward was there with a lot of
 his cattle. We understand that all
 the way from his place to Tyrone and
 south of his place to the 15th con. of
 Proton is all under bush. No wonder
 that cattle having so much ground to
 pasture or feed when they come to the
 fair can look so fat and glossy.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS NOTES.

New Elevators in Manitoba.
 MONTREAL, July 13.—Ogilvie & Co.
 are building four new elevators in
 Southern Manitoba, each of 50,000
 bushels capacity. They will handle
 over 5,000,000 bushels of wheat this
 year.

Euphrasia Council.

The council met pursuant to adjourn-
 ment on 29th June, 1888. Members
 all present. Minutes of last session
 of Court of Revision and last session
 of council read and confirmed.

A petition, signed by R. Carefoot
 and others, laid over until next meet-
 ing of council, and Mr. Stuart in-
 structed to examine the ground pro-
 posed for road.

Mr. Stuart was instructed to get 8d
 and 4th sideroad and bridge over
 Beaver river repaired.

Mr. Boyd was instructed to get re-
 pairs made on 9th line at lots 9 and
 16.

The Treasurer was instructed to re-
 ceive from Wm. Dunlop \$3, payment
 for statute labor in 1887.

Mr. Erskine was instructed to repair
 sidelines 6 and 7, in the 11th and 12th
 concessions.

A grant of \$10 was made, to be ex-
 pended by William McConnel, path-
 master, in his road division.

Mr. Erskine was instructed to meet
 commissioner from Holland with a
 view to improving town line.

The Reeve and Mr. McAuslan were
 appointed to make repairs on 27 and
 28 side line, cons. 1 and 2.

Mr. Stuart was instructed to meet
 commissioner of Artemesia, with a
 view to improving town line.

Mr. Boyd was instructed to improve
 12 and 13 side lines, cons. 7 and 8.

The Treasurer was ordered to remit
 to J. Paterson, Mirror office, \$5,
 printing, and to C. W. Rutledge, Mark-
 dale, \$1.50, advertising Court of
 Revision.

The report of W. Welsh, pathmas-
 ter, received and adopted, and the
 Treasurer instructed to remit to the
 parties named therein the amounts
 placed opposite to their names, total
 amount being \$10.

The report of James Erskine, path-
 master, laid before council and adopt-
 ed, and the Treasurer ordered to re-
 mit to the parties named therein the
 amounts placed opposite to their
 names, total amount being \$22.50.

The Reeve's orders were issued on
 the Treasurer to pay as follows, viz.:
 Doctors Sproule & Brodie, \$25, serv-
 ices as Medical Health officers; John
 Mathews, \$5, work on 8rd line; Jas.
 Stinson, \$25, cedar, spikes and work
 on 11th line; R. Dunlop, \$30, part
 salary for current year; Thos. Aber-
 crombie, \$15, gravel and repairing
 road; J. K. Fawcett, \$25.75, cedar
 lumber delivered at several places;
 Thos. Donnelly, \$13, hauling plank
 and work on roads; Samuel Black,
 \$3, to repair bridge on 21 and 22 side
 lines; Wm. Blakely, \$3.56, repairing
 road scrapers; Geo. Julian, \$6, fur-
 nishing plank and work on bridge, 21
 and 22 side lines; Robt. Snell, \$3,
 gravel for road purposes; George
 Mathewson, \$6.75, work on 4th line
 at lot 13; James Fawcett, \$11, cedar
 plank; R. Gilray, Esq., \$6, gravel for
 use on road; Abraham Crabtree, \$2,
 lumber for bridge; George Emery, 75
 cents, and Michael Atkins, 25 cents,
 work on culvert and bridge; Robert
 Campin, \$8, cedar and building three
 culverts; Hugh Curry, \$6, repairing
 road scrapers; George Booth, \$3.50,
 protecting Heathcote bridge.

Council adjourned until the last Fri-
