


**Euphrasia Council.**  
The council met pursuant to adjournment on July 27th, 1888. Minutes of last session were read and confirmed.  
By-law 395 read the third time and passed.  
The Reeve, Mr. Boyd and Mr. Erskine were authorized to take whatever steps they may deem prudent in relation to the culvert on 9th line, at lot 20, so as to do away with alleged grievances said to exist in connection therewith.  
Mr. Stuart was instructed to get estimates made on G and 7 sideline, con. 3.  
Mr. Erskine was instructed to get estimates on 11th line, at lot 26, repaired.  
The Clerk was ordered to give proper notice of a proposed by-law to establish a deviation of 3 and 4 sideline, con. 4.  
Mr. Boyd and Mr. Erskine, who were appointed a committee to examine a part of 15 and 16 sideline, laid before council a report that owing to the rough state of the ground a large amount of money would be required to open the road here for public travel and would not recommend such expenditure at present.  
The Treasurer was instructed to remit to Thos. Plunkett, Esq., Clerk of Division Court, Meaford, \$2, payment for copy of judgment and evidence in suit of Clerk vs. this corporation.  
The report of Jas. Paterson, Esq., in reference to the expenditure of money on 9th line, laid before council and approved and the Treasurer ordered to remit to the parties named therein the amounts placed opposite to their names; total amount \$20.  
Wm. McConnell, Esq., pathmaster, and before council a report of expenditure of grant made by council, the report being approved, the Treasurer was ordered to pay to the parties entitled to payment for work the amounts placed opposite to their names; total amount \$12.  
The Treasurer was ordered to remit to J. G. Sing, P. L. S., \$14, surveying deviation of 3 and 4 sideline, plan, &c. &c.  
The Treasurer was instructed to remit to James Paterson, Mirror office, Meaford, \$22, balance in full of contract, printing minutes and voters lists, and to R. McKnight, Esq., Registrar, \$1, searches required by statute.  
The Reeve's orders were issued on the Treasurer to pay as follows, viz.: John Abercrombie, \$23.50, work on 12 and 13 sideline, con. 8; William Stuart, Esq., \$5.25, to pay men employed by him on road; Wm. Lang, \$23.75, work on 4th line, at lot 14; John Sewell, \$20, balance of contract on deviation road; John Mathews, \$2 work on 6 and 7 sideline; Peter Harris, \$1.50, building culvert on 6 and 7 sideline, con. 6; Thos. Foster, \$23.50, work on 12 and 13 sideline, con. 2 and 3; Wm. Dales, \$50, balance of contract on Kerr's Hill; Wm. Dales, \$6.68, plank furnished; Richard Snelgrove, \$4, repairing culverts, con. 6; John Alexander, \$11.50, work on valley road, at lot 3; Joseph Sparling, \$5, opening road to gravel pit; James Cook, \$1.80, lumber for culverts; John Kingston, \$5, gravel furnished; Jas. Lawrence, \$10, repairing bridge over Beaver river; George Hutchinson, \$2, repairing bridge; Patrick Carson, \$10, support as adjacent.  
Council adjourned until last Friday in August next.

There was no real damage done within the limits of the village, but from other quarters we hear of buildings being demolished, lives lost, etc., for the storms were generally over western Ontario. A. McCauley's barn, near Kimberley, was unroofed, and Mr. Moffat, living about six miles from Feversham, in Collingwood township, had his barn and one or two horses burned.—Advance.
