NOTE AND COMMENT.

—Mr. Henry Taylor was released from gaol at London last Saturday. —Senator Ferguson, St. John, N. B., died on Tuesday last.

—The Dominion oatmeal mill at London, was burned on Monday; loss \$15,000.

—The Winnipeg Free Press says financial arrangements have been completed for the building of the Hudson Bay railway.

—The motion to ratify the Fishery Treaty was lost in the U. S. Senate on Tuesday last by 30 to 27.

—Hon. John Haggart, Postmaster-General, was re-elected by acclamation in South Lanark last week.

—The Manitoba Government has awarded the contracts for the Portage la Prairie extension of the Red River Valley railway.

—O'Connor and Temer are to have a race on Sept. 26 for the championship of America and \$1,000 a side, probably on Chautauqua Lake.

—The by-law for the consolidation of Toronto's debentures was carried yesterday by 639 to 549. The by law for the purchase of the Zoo, was defeated by 949 to 248.

—The Dominion Post office annual returns are said to be of an eminently gratifying nature, indicating the rapid expansion of the volume of postal traffic.

—Manitoba crops have escaped the recent cold wave and slight frost without injury. The yield will be much in excess of any previous year.

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TELEGRAPHIC NEWS NOTES.

Spring Wheat in Minnesota and Dakota. MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Aug. 17.—Reports from 1,200 correspondents in Minnesota and Dakota show that the damage to the spring wheat crop has at no time been over-estimated.

A Kincairdine Fire. KINCAIRDINE, Aug. 18.—About 10:30 last night a fire broke out in the Royal hotel stables, completely destroying the building. Loss about \$400, covered by insurance in the Phoenix.

Omamee Station Burned. OMEMEE, Aug. 18.—The G. T. R. Junction station here was burned this morning at 8 o'clock. The fire is supposed to have been the work of an incendiary. Everything is a total loss.

An Illicit Still Seized. ROTHSAY, Ont., Aug. 17.—A Cavan, collector of inland revenue at Stratford, and Officer Dingman, of Palmerston, seized an illicit still in the township of Minto to-day in full operation; also a quantity of grain. The owner was arrested and tried before P. M. Lowes and sentenced to be imprisoned for five months and to pay a penalty of \$400.

Canon Farrar's Christianity. THE WIDENESS OF THE CHURCH OF CHRIST. The following stirring passages formed part of the discourse delivered recently in Westminster Abbey by Archbishop Farrar, in anticipation of the approaching Conference of Bishops.

Perish the hand which would circumscribe by one hair's breadth the limits or the definition of the Church of Christ; perish the arms that would exclude from that one flock of the Good Shepherd the "other sheep which are not of this fold;" perish the narrow superstition that the wind of God, which "bloweth where it listeth, and thou hearest the sound thereof, but canst not tell whence it cometh or whither it goeth," can only be conveyed by mechanical transmissions.

When I speak of the Church in general I do not mean this or that communion, under this or that organization, but I mean in their ten thousand times ten thousand and thousand of thousands, the whole multitude of the saints of God. What! are we not to claim as full and honored members of the Church of Christ in every possible true sense of that word because they were Moravians, those holy missionaries who planted successfully

Sweet Sharon's Rose On icy plains or in eternal snows? Or Williams, the Apostle of Polynesia, and the martyr of Erromanga, because he was a Dissenter? Dr. Carey, and others in India, because they were Baptists? Or Elizabeth Fry, because she was a Quakeress? If there are any who think that He who died for all mankind cares mainly or chiefly for outward organization, their views of Christ are not such as I learn from Him who made keeping the commandments the essential of entering into the Kingdom of Heaven.

I say with Whitefield: "Do they profess repentance towards God and faith in our Lord Jesus Christ? If so they are my brethren." True and unwaveringly loyal in my love for the Church of England, yet I would stand bare-headed before any true saint of God, and be he Romanist or Independent, or Quaker or Presbyterian, so he be a saint of God, desiring ten thousand-fold more that I may stand with him before the throne of Christ rather than with those who, though they may have had "Lead, Lead," or "The Church, the Church," for ever on their lips, and have spent their lives in the endless round of outward ordinances, may yet, if their lives have been unloving and unlovely, have those awful words, "Woe unto you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites!"
