**Write Plainly.**  
Business men, as a rule, write their signature badly. Usually the signature is the worst written part of the letter. Why is this so? To the owner of the signature it is an easy enough matter to understand it, but easy it is to no one who is unacquainted with it. Those who read character by the hand writing always looks carefully at the signature. It tells more than any other part. A good bold decipherable signature is a novelty these days, and the hotel registers are too often mere Chinese puzzles, which even the hotel clerks, used to all kinds of signatures, are not able to decipher. Among business men it is sometimes necessary to cut the signature from a letter and paste it on the envelope in the hope that somebody may be able to decipher it when it reaches the post-office from which it was sent. In many signatures there is a good deal of affectation. People should get into the habit of writing their signatures so legibly that he who runs may read. The signature is something that every man who writes at all writes often enough to be able to write plainly. Why, then, should he seek to tangle it up so that nobody can tell what it is?

**Good and Bad Farming.**

There is one marked feature in farming that a year like this brings out distinctly, says an exchange. Good farmers have good crops and poor farmers have no crops at all to speak of. This is generally the case but not in such a marked degree as in a year like this. Men who feed lots of good feed and have any amount of rich manure can always have a crop, while men who trust to rain to rot their straw-stack to make manure, cannot get a crop half the time. It is a case of the survival of the fittest. Land cannot produce unless it is nourished.

**Good Manners.**

Never try to outshine, but to please. Never press a favor where it seems undesired.  
Never intrude ill-health, pains, losses or misfortunes.  
Never intentionally wound the feelings of a human being.  
Never talk or laugh aloud in public places or upon the street.  
Never forget that vulgarity has its origin in ignorance or selfishness.  
Never urge another to do anything against his desire unless you see danger before him.  
Never omit to perform a kind act when it can be done with any reasonable amount of exertion.  
Never needlessly wound the vanity of another or dilate unnecessarily upon a disagreeable subject.  
Remember that good manners are thoughts filled with kindness and refinement and then translated into behavior.  
Be not ostentatious in dress or deportment; nothing can be more vulgar. See that costumes fit the time and occasion.  
Be rude to none; rudeness harms not even the humblest and poorest to whom it is directed, but injures the exhibitors.

**How Interest Increases.**

Very few persons have figured out the difference between six and eight per cent. One dollar loaned for one hundred years at six per cent. will have the interest collected annually added to the principal, will amount to \$840. At eight per cent. it amounts to \$2,208, or nearly seven times as much. At three per cent. the annual rate of interest in England, at present rate of interest in England, it amounts to \$19,25; whereas at ten per cent. which has been a very common rate in the United States, it is \$18,000. At about seven hundred times as much. At twelve per cent. it amounts to \$75, or more than four thousand times as much. At eighteen per cent. it amounts to \$15,145,007. At twenty-four per cent. (which we sometimes hear talked of) it reaches the enormous sum of \$2,551,799,404.
