Maxwell to the Front.
ASSOCIATION OF FARMERS' AND PEOPLE'S
INSTITUTE WITH MONTHLY CATTLE
SELLING FAIRS.

compliance with a requisition to Mr. A.
Stavner, organizer of Institutes
Farmers' Councils and Monthly Selling
Fairs, a public meeting was held here on
Friday, Aug. 11th, when a Farmers' and
People's Institute for the village of Maxwell
in the adjacent country was successfully organ-
ized with the following officers, viz.—Thos.
Walker, President; W. Sproule and J. Gamey,
Vice-Presidents; Dr. Scott, Secretary; W.
Walker, Treasurer; R. Coutts, Captain; H.
Walker, Lieutenant. A Finance Committee of
five, an Executive Committee of twelve, and
three Auditors were also elected.

The meeting was well attended and a deep
interest was manifested by farmers and
citizens in discussing the necessity of estab-
lishing public grain-weighting markets, the
formation of monthly selling fairs and other
matters which would benefit agriculturists
and citizens generally.

Among other business transacted, the fol-
lowing resolutions were adopted, viz. :—
That monthly public fairs shall be held in
the village of Maxwell under the auspices of
said Farmers' and People's Institute and that
the first of said fairs will be held on Friday,
Oct. 5th, and continue monthly thereafter on
the Friday before Markdale fair for the sale,
purchase or exchange of horses, cattle and
other live stock, dairy and other agricultural
products. This Institute respectfully recom-
mends farmers and citizens generally to
assist with the fair and to co-operate in pe-
titioning the Township and County Council
and Governments as follows :—

PETITION—FOR PRESENTATION.
TO THE HONORABLE THE DOMINION HOUSE OF
COMMONS, OTTAWA.

The petition of the undersigned humbly
sheweth

That petitions of Alex. Currie, J. P. and other
agriculturists, and of Jno. McCollman, master
granger, and others of Nottawasaga, and of vari-
ous other municipalities of the Province of On-
tario, were presented by Hon. Sir Richard J.
Cartwright, to the House of Commons, and a bill
was introduced by the Hon. Mr. Costigan, as to
"Weighing in Elevators of the Dominion."

Whereas, petitioners pray, said Honorable
House of Commons, to make more effective pro-
visions so as to carry out a uniform method of
public weighing markets, by public scales, and
licensed weighers at said elevators; and also, as
far as practicable to influence the respective
Provincial Governments of Ontario and other
Provinces, with all Municipal Councils and
Boards of Trade to co-operate in instituting said
public weighing for all grain-buying stations,
market places and elevators as directly in the
general interest of the farmers, and people, of
whom many persons know how to successfully
establish same, to greatly benefit agriculturists
and the people of villages, towns, townships and
cities.

"That every weigher so licensed shall forthwith
take and subscribe before a justice of the peace
an oath of office in the form or to the effect
following:—

"I, A. B., do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I
will faithfully, truly and impartially, to the best
of my skill and ability, execute and perform the
duties of weigher; so help me God."

That said public scales and weighers along
with public elevators, at economical costs, for
market accommodation, are specially to make
public-like competition, with cash payments be-
tween farmers and purchasers of general pro-
duce at all market places. As, also, to promote
cattle, horse and sheep selling fairs, with other
agricultural productions and requirements, in-
cluding the organizing of creameries, cheese
factories or other industries through farmers
and people's institutes or other institutions.

That your Honorable House of Commons may
also recommend or institute another uniform
method of selling and purchasing grain, with
certain other produce and natural products of
our fertile country by the central system of 100
pounds.

That such, if established, coupled with foresaid
public weighing markets, to properly develop
public competition, must prove a public benefit
to the farmers and the people of Canada, the
United States, Great Britain, Ireland and other
countries, whether with or without the adoption
of Commercial Union or Unrestricted Trade, as
this would result a large saving in scales, money,
time and labor from a fair use of public scales to
farmers and general purchasing consumers.

Glenelg Council.
The Glenelg Council met on August 20th.
Members all present; the Reeve in the chair.
Minutes of last meeting read and confirmed.
Communications were read—From C. W.
Rutledge printing account; from Donald
McDougald, account for repair of a bridge;
from the Clerk of Artemesia re obstruction
at townline, near Priceville; from the Reeve,
report of committee re deviation at lot 101,
con. 3, W. T. R.; from the Reeve and Clerk,
a report with agreement re financial matters,
Glenelg and Markdale; from Wm. Walker,
a claim for refund of purchase money on parts
of lots 83 and 84, con. 3, W. T. R., being
lands belonging to the Crown Mr. A. T.
Bigger addressed the council on behalf of
Glenelg Agricultural Society; from Mr. F.
Sarjeant, a claim for damages sustained at
Allan's sink hole.

McMillan—Sullivan—That the report of
committee re road deviation on lot 101, con.
3, S. W. T. & S. R., be adopted and engrossed
on the minutes.—Carried.

McMillan—Williams—That the Reeve be
instructed to confer with the township of
Holland relative to the erection of a hand
rail on the bridge across Allan's sink hole,
and, if satisfactory arrangements can be com-
pleted, that he be authorized to proceed with
the work.—Carried.

Boyce—Williams—That the report of ad-
justing committee, relative to the financial
affairs of this township and the village of
Markdale, be adopted, and that the agree-
ment be signed by the Reeve and Clerk and
have the seal of the corporation attached
thereto.—Carried.

McMillan—Boyce—That the Clerk instruct
the County Treasurer to transfer all the lands
of the township of Glenelg, now incorporated
into the village of Markdale, from the books
of the said township and place the same on
the book for the village of Markdale, includ-
ing all taxes charged on the said books
against such lands, amounting to the sum of
\$53.87, and credit all arrears collected or to
be collected from said lands to the said vil-
lage of Markdale, pursuant to the agreement
with the council of that municipality.—
Carried.

Williams—Boyce—That the sum of \$10 be
granted to Glenelg Agricultural Society pro-
viding the village of Markdale grant an equi-
valent.—Carried.

McMillan—Sullivan—That \$7 be granted
for crosswaying townline Glenelg and Egremont,
opposite lot 23, providing Egremont
grant an equivalent.—Carried.

By-laws 261 and 262, levying rates and ap-
pointing collectors, were passed and ordered
to be engrossed on the by-law book.

McMillan—Boyce—That the clerk be in-
structed to procure 200 forms for Treasurer's
quarterly statements.—Carried.

Williams—McMillan—That Mrs. Eliza
McComb be exempted from performing
statute labor for the current year.—Carried.

McMillan—Sullivan—That the communi-
cation from the clerk of Artemesia relative to
removal of obstruction at river on townline
G. and A. be laid over for further infor-
mation.—Carried.

McMillan—Sullivan—That Peter Neil be
paid \$11 for repairing bridge on sideroad, at
lot 10, con. 4, N. D. R.—Carried.

Williams—Boyce—That the sum of \$112.28
be refunded to Wm. Walker, being the am't
of his claim for the purchase of lots 83 and
84, con. 3, S. W. T. & S. R., which were sold
in error for arrears of taxes, but which are
the property of the Ontario Government, and
consequently beyond the control of this
municipality.—Carried.

Williams—Boyce—That the sum of \$5 be
paid to Samuel Whitmore for gravel for
Lambton street.—Carried.

McMillan—Sullivan—That Donald Mc-
Dougald be paid \$5 for repairing bridge on
sideroad 50, S. D. R.—Carried.

on the Treasurer for the following amounts,
viz.:—Wm. Kenny, for repairing bridge at
Glenelg, \$15; Neil McLachlan, for build-
ing bridge on sideroad 80, con. 2, N. D. R.,
\$159.50; A. McMillan, for removing jam
from Saugeen on lot 41, con. 2, N. D. R.,
\$90.—Carried.
