**MARKDALE'S PLUM.**—The respective committees of the township of Artemesia and village of Markdale, appointed to arrange financial matters between Artemesia and the newly incorporated village, met at Dr. Christie's office, Flesher-ton, on Friday last. There were present on behalf of Artemesia the reeve, Dr. Christie, and Mr. McArthur; the other member of committee not putting in an appearance. Mr. J. McFarland, reeve, and Wm. Brown, Esq., appeared for Markdale. The following settlement was arrived at, viz., Markdale to receive \$128, being nearly four cents in the dollar of the total assets of the township, and is to receive at the same rate its proportion of non-resident taxes in Co. Treasurer's hands at time of its incorporation. It is also provided that in case the Township is entitled to any government grant at or before incorporation of Markdale, it is to receive its share at the same rate unless the amount be settled by government.—Flesherton Advance.
