 Mt. Forest has seven new J. P.'s.

 Collingwood Methodists are preparing to build a new church.
 150 new lock boxes have been added to the post-office at Owen Sound.
 Owen Sound is troubled night and day with the yelps of scurvy dogs.
 A. M. Tyson of Warton shot a 300 lb deer near that village recently.
 Teeswater butter factory is sending 18,000 lbs of butter to the Old Country.
 John Smith of Bentinck is going to Algoma with a gang of 200 men to take out saw logs.
 Dundalk is moving in the direction of fire protection and a Hook and Ladder Co. is being organized.
 130 conversions are reported as a result of Mr. Ferdinand Schiverea's evangelical service in Owen Sound.

 The Owen Sound Times was established 35 years ago, and last week commenced its 25th year under the present proprietorship.

 The C. P. R. are putting in long through sidings at Holland Centre, Berkeley, Flesherston, Dundalk, Corbetton and Shelburne. This will expedite traffic on what has now become one of the busiest lines in Canada.
