GRANTING BONUSES .- The law passed at the last session of the Ontario Legislature, and which came into force on the first of November, will practically shut out the granting of bonuses by municipal corporations. Municipalities are prohibited from giving a bonus to a manu-facturer in any town to move to another 'Success town. And a bonus by-law will in all cases in the future have to be carried by a two-thirds vote of all the ratepayers who are entitled to vote on such a bylaw, and no aid can be granted to a firm if works of a similar nature are already doing business in the place.
