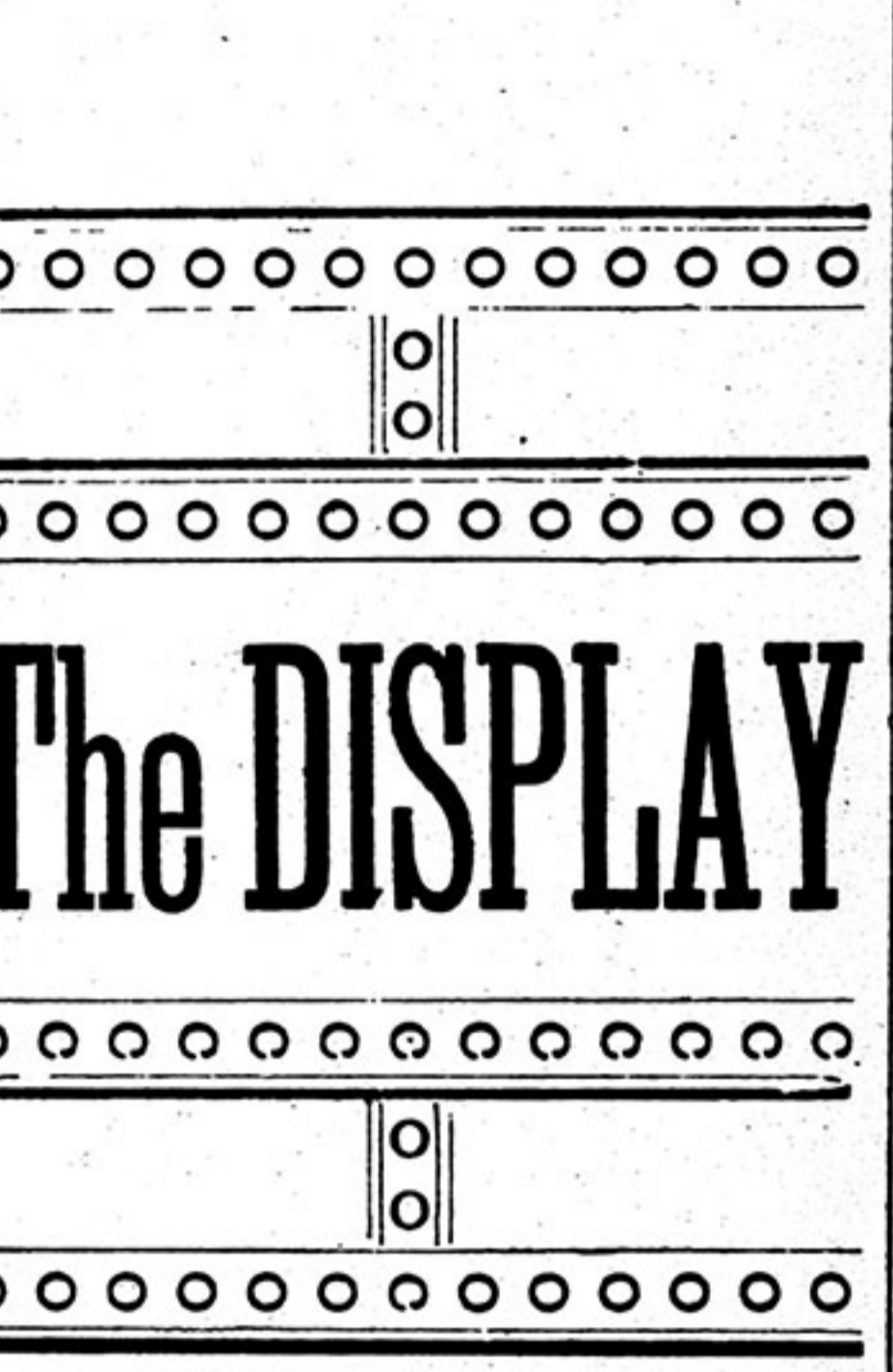

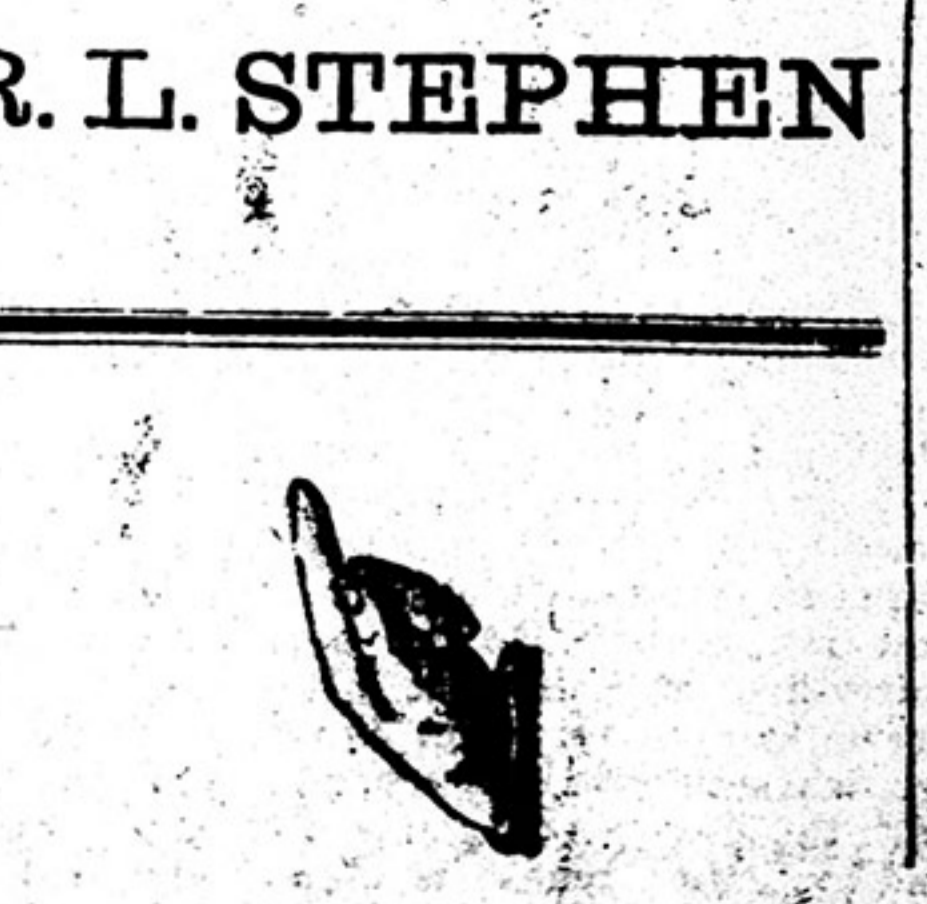

December Sessions.
 His Honor Judge Macpherson opened Court at 1 p. m. on Tuesday, Twenty-four grand jurors answered the roll call and they retired to the grand jury room and shortly found a 'true bill' against Frank O'Meara on each of two different charges of breaking and larceny. There are six cases on the civil list.

NOTER vs. GIBSON—An undated action for balance of an account, was speedily disposed of. J. M. Kilbourne for plaintiff.

EATON vs. SMITH—Also an action for balance of a liquor account. The plaintiff is a brewer in the town of Owen Sound and the defendant is a restaurant keeper in the town of Orangeville. The defence, among other pleas, set up that the defendant, Mrs. Smith, had no license to sell liquor, and that during part of the currency of the account, the Scott Act was in force in the county of Dufferin, and that the plaintiff was aware of both those facts when he supplied her with ale from time to time. Argument on the legal issues involved in the action postponed until tomorrow afternoon. Jas. Masson, Q. C., for plaintiff. Jno. Creaser, Q. C., for defendant.

McDUFFY vs. C.P.R.—Plaintiff lives in Glenelg township, and has for neighbors Mr. Campbell and Mr. Beaton. The C.P.R. crosses all three farms. Plaintiff alleged that the part of the three farms which lay back of the railway track had been fenced in and used by the three owners as a common pasture; that about the 4th of July last the railway fence on the Beaton farm was burnt, and that about the 25th of July one of plaintiff's colts had been killed by a passing train; that the value of the colt was \$80 or \$100. Several witnesses for the plaintiff were called and examined, after which the defendant's council stated that he would not advance any evidence and argued that the action should be dismissed on the following grounds: 1st, That plaintiff had not proven any negligence on the part of the defendants; 2nd, That, while an agreement had been shown to exist between the plaintiff and Mr. Campbell, that they should use the rear of both farms as a common pasture ground, no such agreement had been shown to exist between plaintiff and Mr. Beaton; that therefore, so far as plaintiff was concerned, defendants were only obliged to maintain a good fence across the plaintiff's and Mr. Campbell's farms. Action dismissed. James Masson for plaintiff; J. B. Alesworth for defendants.

REG. vs. O'NEAL was disposed of Wednesday forenoon. The prisoner was arraigned, and the indictment charged him with breaking into Carson Price's store at Holland Centre and with the larceny of certain goods. He pleaded "Not Guilty," after which the Crown wound around him a very strong chain of evidence. Constable Galbraith produced a complete kit of burglar's tools which he found on the prisoner, also a revolver. Verdict—Guilty. Sentence—seven years in Penitentiary. Alford Frost for the Crown; J. M. Kilbourne, by request, for the prisoner.

POLLARD vs. MEAFORD occupied the greater part of Wednesday afternoon. The plaintiff, Col. Pollard, sued the town of Meaford for \$200 damages, claimed on account of bodily injuries received through the alleged defectiveness of defendants' sidewalk. Argument postponed until tomorrow afternoon. Jas. Masson for plaintiff; John Creaser for defendants.

CREIGHTON vs. GRAHAM—An undated case, was the last case on the docket. Jas. Masson for plaintiff.
