Our Ottawa Letter.

Special to the Standard.

OTTAWA, April 30.—Well, Parliament is over and for nine months the government can breathe freely. As I predicted the session lasted the full average or rather the full minimum duration, three months or thirteen weeks exactly. The representatives voted about forty millions of money, passed some hundred and fifty bills and talked some four thousand columns of Hansard. The session cost the country \$800,000.

AN ORATORICAL DUEL.

The last week has been full of visions. Mr. Mulock attacked the Minister of Militia declared he had lost the confidence of the Ontario volunteers and moved to this effect. The motion was lost by 41 majority, two Conservatives, Messrs. Clarke Wallace and Cimon voting against Sir Adolphe Caron. There was quite an oratorical duel between the fighting member for North York and the minister of war. Sir Adolphe wears good fitting clothes, a magnificent moustache and an eye-glass and is often spoken of as a dandy. But he does not lack courage in debate. Mr. Mulock held him guiltless of any military knowledge and declared he could not manoeuvre a battalion of barnyard fowls. In reply Sir Adolphe told Mr. Mulock he was rude and insolent and not fit for the company of gentlemen. In a spouted speech he said he had raised a company during the Trent affair and served under De Salaberry, 'whose name was written in the golden pages of Canada's most brilliant history.' He ascribed the attacks upon him to his nationality. Of the eight ministers of militia since Confederation three have been French Canadian—Carter, Masson and Caron. Mr. Mackenzie had three different ministers of militia but not one of them was French.

A BOW IN THE CAMP.

There was last week quite a row among the front benches of the Opposition. On Wednesday Mr. Charlton inquired what the government was going to do about the lumbermen's demand that the duty of three dollars a thousand feet on logs exported in their natural state be taken off. The government declined to say what they intended to do in the matter. Mr. Charlton is himself largely interested in lumbering and looked for favorable action from the government so he did not press them. The Opposition, however, thought the government should be pressed, and on Friday Mr. Barron was put up to move that the House regretted the recent increase of one dollar in the export duty. Mr. Charlton, who had, like Achilles, been sulking since Wednesday, condemned the motion as ill advised, not because it did not represent his views, but because it would make it harder for the government to give in to them. The entire Opposition, however, voted for the amendment, Mr. Charlton leaving the Chamber. The government's majority was 36.

SATURDAY'S SITTING.

For the second time the House sat on Saturday and was in concurrence on the Estimates. Sir Richard Cartwright moved to condemn the government's financial administration. Mr. Davies the Intercolonial Railway administration, and other motions were made to put the parties on record, all being voted down by about the same majority, 39 to 70. It will be seen that many members had gone home. The extradition bill, with the restrictive clause struck out, passed both Houses; the Copyright bill was also passed in the Senate.

THE HISTORICAL MACE

The Mace of silver and gold which the Sergeant-At-Arms carried before the Speaker into the Senate Chamber at prorogation is an historical emblem of authority. The 25th inst. was the fortieth anniversary of the burning of the Parliament buildings in Montreal when the members of the House were chased from the chamber and the big Mace carried off by one of the mob. The portrait of Papien was torn down and jumped on and a scene of free fighting ensued before the buildings were fired. The man who tagged off the mace was so frightened at his act of high treason that he subsequently retraced it surreptitiously. The mace was, however, minus one of the little golden beavers that surmount the crest.

THE VACANCY IN COMPTON.

For the seat in the Commons vacant by the death of the Hon. Mr. Pope the Conservatives have nominated his son, Mr. Rufus Pope, a farmer. An Mr. Pope represented Compton since Confederation and as his majority last election was 824 it is altogether likely that the son will succeed the father. This has been the case with Hon. G. A. Kirkpatrick, Mr. Hahn, Mr. White and Mr. Cimon.

Mr. Cimon, by the way, has bolted from the government support. He refused to attend the adjourned Ministerial caucus on Friday and voted want of confidence in the government by supporting Mr. Mulock's amendment censuring the minister of militia. It arises from Mr. Cimon's dissatisfaction at the railway subsidies though he is said to be disaffected on other questions. He may be following in the footsteps of his father who described himself as 'a Conservative opposed to the government of Sir John Macdonald.'

NOTES.

Dr. Bergin has been very sick. An effort is being made to reconstitute the 18th Battalion of Prescott. The Press Gallery on Saturday made a presentation to Mr. Hugh Mathewson, the Vice-President, on the occasion of his approaching marriage to an Ottawa lady. The Royal Society of Canada meets here in annual session May 7. Next week I will say something about the Society and its eminent members. Contrary to the statement made last winter Mr. Blake stayed out the session and did not go south. He did not make a single speech or do any work. He was merely a spectator. He spoke in number six at the presentation to Whip Trow who was given an oil painting of himself and a seal ring. Mr. Trow is very popular. Sir John Macdonald has borne the work of the session splendidly. He appears almost insensible to fatigue.

Markdale Council.

Minutes of 4th meeting of the municipal council of the village of Markdale, held the 25th day of April, 1889. Members all present except Mr. Lucas. The reeve in the chair. Minutes of last meeting read and confirmed.

Communications—From township clerk of Holland in reference to rent of hall for Division court; from reeve of Glenelg ancient statute labor; clerk's account for quarter ending 31st Mch.; from the Waterous Engine Works Co. with description of their steam fire engine for village use.

Brown—Haskett—That the clerk of this village be and is hereby instructed to write the clerk of Glenelg asking for the following information:

1st. Date of passing By-law to commute statute labor in the village of Markdale.

2nd. The number of days statute labor returned unperformed each year since passing of said By-law.—Carried.

Brown—Haskett—That the clerk's bill of \$12.70 and R. Askin's for 75c. for opening snow roads last March be paid.—Carried.

The committee appointed to examine treasurer's bond presented their report as follows:

We, the committee appointed to examine treasurer's bonds, beg to report that we have examined said bonds and find them sufficient.

Brown—Pleves—That Messrs. Plewes, Haskett and the mover be a road and bridge committee to look after the roads, streets and bridges in the corporation.—Carried.

Pleves—Haskett—That the reeve and Messrs. Brown and Lucas be a committee for sidewalks and crossings.—Carried.

Brown—Haskett—That Geo. Noble be appointed village constable (without salary), whose duty it shall be to enforce the By-laws of the village, &c.—Carried.

Brown—Pleves—That the council grant the sum of \$10 to the Spring Stock Show Society of Markdale for the present year.—Carried. Mr. Haskett dissenting.

Haskett—Pleves—That the council offer a reward of \$10 to any person who will give such information as will lead to the conviction of any person who violates any of the provisions of the Ontario Liquor License Acts.—Carried.

Brown—Haskett—That this council meet one week from to-night at 7:30 p. m. sharp.—Carried.

Council adjourned.
