FALSEHOOD.

Falsehood is one of the commonest evils in human nature and one which would require an article of great length to fully explain, first it is a weakness in human character and no person having a reasonable amount of honor would for the life of him be found guilty of intentional falsehood. The weakness of character which is common to the false is due partly to the education in early life or which is termed their bringing up and partly due to weak mind from nature which in some cases is almost impossible to tide over the habit of falsehood by the most careful education. Falsehood is more common among children than adults owing to honor increasing with age which makes the majority ashamed of the habit and are redeemed, but a few of the weakest are so regardless of honor as to grow in the habit until it becomes a disease and they are scarcely aware of the fact that every utterance of their lips is partial or entirely false. One of the strongest proofs of the weakness of character of the false is they will tell of big things they have done, big things they have seen, big possessions and great relatives, &c., and appear never to detect that their listeners do not believe a word they say. Liars are not as dangerous as some people suppose simply because people easily detect them, even a stranger gives signs sufficient to detect his falsehood in every few words. Consequently the wise never carry their tales if they be laden with dangerous material and people of fair judgement are seldom deceived by them to any extent. The habit does themselves more harm than anybody else. It is as impossible for a false person to become an honorable and useful member of society as to swim across the Atlantic Ocean. The young who aspire to eminence should be exceedingly careful of their truthfulness as it is the strongest principal in human character and the basis of every other virtue. Boys and girls tell the truth even though you may for the time condemn yourself or bring indignation or punishment upon yourself, make it a point never to tell a falsehood and it will strengthen your character more than any other resolution you can make, and you will ever look back upon your life which pride as you go onward and upwards to honor and usefulness, beloved by every good and honorable person who knows you.
