R. of the United States. Gen. Davis was a brave and skilful soldier, a courageous and able statesman and a leader who was deeply loved. Gen. Davis was born in Kentucky in 1808, but was brought up in Mississippi. He graduated from West Point and served with distinction campaigns in the West against the Indians, in Mexico and in Texas. He was a Senator for Mississippi and Scoretury at 10 a. m. of War in Polk's administration. He

was elected Provisional President of the Confederate States in 1861 and President in 1862. After the capture of Richmond Gen. Davis was taken by the Federal authorities and lodged in Fortress Minerva for two years. He was never brought to trial, but his rights of citizenship were taken from him and he remained to the day of his death without them. He was released in 1867, and resided for some time in Montreal, having a house on Mountain street and frequenting St. Francois Xavier street, where he had friends in business. He has since lived in Memphis, Tennessee.


