Searle Dead.

The history of professional aquatics, a branch of sport in which Canadians have always been proficient, has no sadder chapter than that which tells of the brief career of Henry Ernest Searle. To have journeyed half way around the globe to battle for and win the championship of the world at one of the noblest of sports, and to reach one's native land a few weeks later a dying man, is a fateful combination of circumstances that has not before been known. On the ninth of September the stalwart young Australian won his honors by defeating William O'Connor on the Thames. Exactly three months later he is dead in the land that was so proud of his prowess.

He was very ill with typhoid fever when the ship on which he sailed from England reached Adelaide, and in spite of all that wealth and anxious care could do the disease resulted fatally. Searle's rise to fame was rapid; in 1888 he rowed his first race in a shell boat, and in 1889 he was the champion of the world. Searle was born at Grafton, on the Clarence River, in New South Wales, 23 years ago, and when he sailed for home after winning the championship he fully expected to row another race in defence of his title within the next few months.
