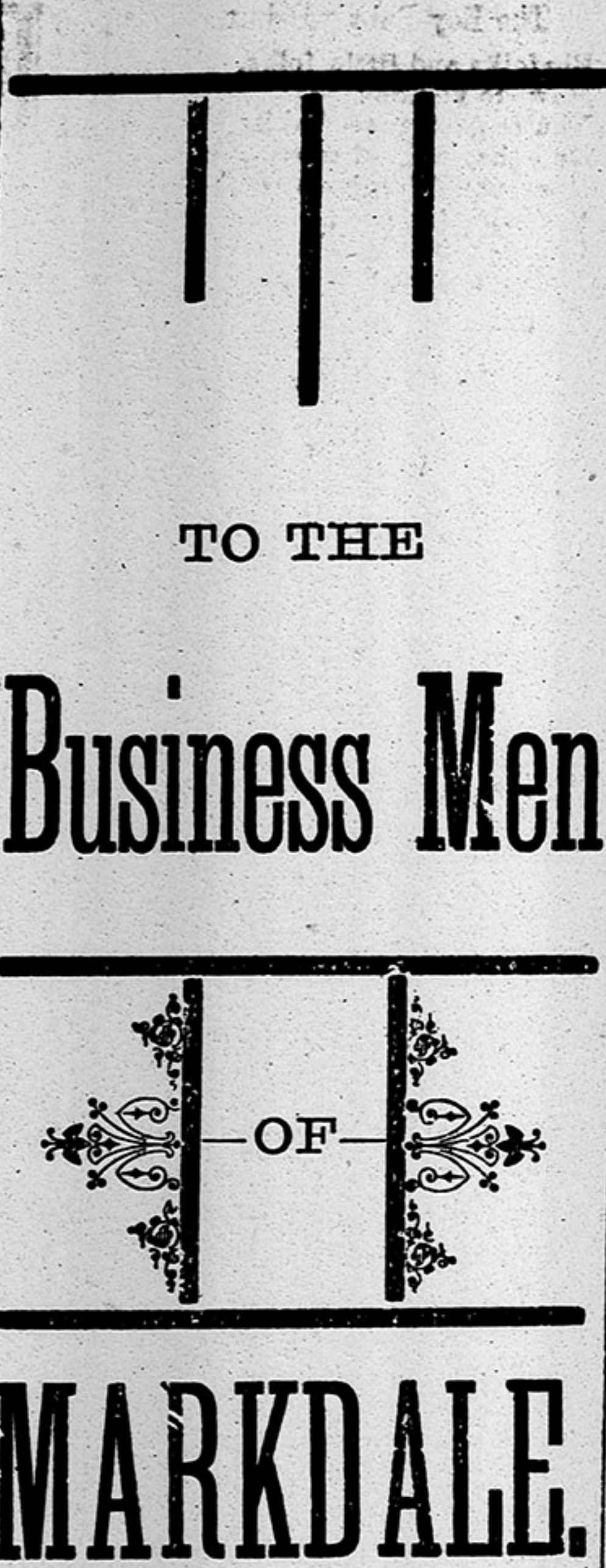

Allen, begging not to be appointed Pathmaster; from the auditors, their report of the Receipts and Expenditures, with a special report as instructed by resolution of council. Russel made personal application to the council for assistance to enable him to be admitted to the Toronto General Hospital to be treated for a sore leg.

Beaton—Neil—That the tender of C. W. Rutledge, for printing, be accepted.—Carried.
Davis—Staples—That cheque No. 49, on the Treasurer for \$2, be cancelled.—Carried.
Neil—Beaton—That the report of the auditors, as ordered by this council at its last session, relative to the assertion made on last nomination day by Thomas Davis to the effect that the late council had over-expended revenue of last year to the amount of \$400.00, be published and engrossed on the minutes.—Carried.
Davis—Beaton—That By-law No. 276 be now read a third time, signed, sealed and engrossed on By-law book.—Carried.

A Serious Conflagration.
The University Buildings at Toronto in Ruins.
On Friday evening last about 6:30 fire broke out in the University Buildings, Queen's Park, Toronto, and in less than two hours naught but a saddened heap of ruins remained. The hungry firey element made such rapid progress that the city fire extinguishing appliances were of no avail. The buildings cost some \$500,000 and were the pride of Toronto, and indeed of the whole province, being second to none in the Dominion except perhaps the parliament buildings at Ottawa. The fire originated by the upsetting of a lamp. There is some \$160,000 of insurance including the contents.
THE BRIGHT SIDE.
There is, in our opinion, always a bright as well as a dark side to a question, and while the destruction by fire of these grand and costly buildings is a calamity to be regretted by all, yet, if the sad affair had taken place two hours later when the Annual Conversations of the institution would have been in full progress there might have been scores of lives lost; furthermore, while the loss is great, and in reference to the fine library and excellent museum at least partially irreparable, yet it is borne by the province and no individual or family is crushed financially as is often the case when their earthly possessions are swept away by fire; then again, the rebuilding of such a structure will give employment to hundreds of poor and thus it is an ill wind that blows no good.
