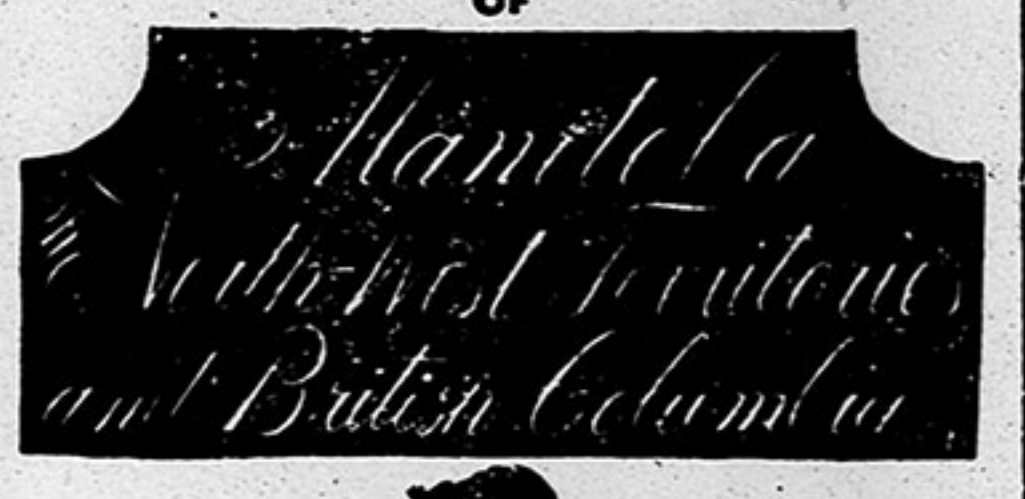

THE LICENSING LAW.

The Provincial Secretary has introduced a bill which proposes to make some important changes in the Liquor License Act. The amendments will doubtless be welcomed by all who wish to reduce the evils of the liquor traffic to a minimum. If the bill becomes law the difficulty of getting liquor licenses will be increased. At present the License commissioners can grant a license to an applicant for premises not under license, unless a majority of the electors of the sub-division petition against it. The bill provides:

"In the case of an applicant for a tavern or shop license by a person who is not at the time of making such application a licensee under this act, or as to premises which are not then licensed, the petition must be accompanied by a certificate signed by a majority of the electors entitled to vote at elections for the Legislative Assembly in the polling sub-division in which the premises sought to be licensed are situated, and the said majority must include a least one-third of the electors who are at the time of the application residents within such polling sub-division."

In an unorganized district the certificate must be signed by at least ten out of the twenty householders residing nearest to the premises in which the applicant proposes to carry on the business for which his license is asked.

The bill also proposes some changes in regard to the sale of liquor on vessels, the amount paid for licenses, the powers of policemen, inspectors, constables, or other officers, in dealing with unlicensed premises. The penalties for infringements of the Act are dealt with.

There is a very important clause in regard to the sale of liquor to minors. It is enacted that any licensed person who allows liquor of any kind by sale or otherwise to be supplied to a minor who is not a resident in the premises, or a bona fide guest or lodger, shall, as well as the person who actually supplies the liquor, be liable to a penalty of not less than \$10 and not exceeding \$20 for each offence.

At present municipalities can limit the number of license by a by-law passed before the 1st day of March in any year, but they have not the power to prohibit the sale of liquor altogether. The bill enacts:

The council of every township, city, town and incorporated village may pass by-laws for prohibiting the sale by retail of spirituous, fermented or other manufactured liquors in any tavern, inn or other house or place of public entertainment, and for prohibiting altogether the sale thereof in shops and places other than houses of public entertainment. Providing that the by-law, before the final passing thereof, has been duly approved of by the electors of the municipality in the manner provided by the sections in that behalf of the Municipal Act. Provided further that nothing in this section contained shall be construed into the exercise of jurisdiction by the Legislature of the Province of Ontario beyond the revival of the provisions of this section which were in force at the date of the passing of the British North America Act, and which subsequent legislation of the province purported to repeal.

Communications.—From County Treasurer with list of lands liable to be sold for arrears of taxes in 1890; from Dorrien Plating and Manufacturing Co.; from John Whitby offering his services as assessor; the Auditors presented their report; accounts from Os. Walker; D. G. McLean and I. O. G. T. was presented.

By-Law No. 28 was introduced and read a 1st and 2nd time.
The committee appointed at last meeting to examine into the Treasurer's surties, report as follows: "Your committee re-Treasurer's surties beg to report that they have examined the surties and find them satisfactory."

Haskett—Plewes—That the application of John Whitby for Assessor be accepted, and that he be paid the sum of Twenty dollars (\$20) for his service.—Carried.

Brown—Haskett—That account of Oswald Walker for \$2.00 for wood, be paid.—Carried.

Brown—Haskett—That By-law No. 28 appointing an assessor, be now read a third time and passed, engrossed and entered in the By-law book.—Carried.

Brown—Plewes—That C. W. Rutledge, W. A. Brown and Solomon Hill be Fence Viewers for this municipality for 1890.—Carried.

Brown—Plewes—That By-law No. 3 be amended by inserting the word "Cows" after horses in the first line thereof, and all other words struck out in said By-law inconsistent therewith.—Lost.

Yeas—Browd and Plewes.
Nays—Haskett, Lyons and the Reeve.

Brown—Haskett—That the Auditors report as presented and criticised be now finally passed by this council, and that the Clerk be authorised to publish the Abstract once in the Markdale Standard.—Carried.

Lyons—Plewes—That the Auditors be each paid the sum of Two dollars for their services.—Carried.

Plewes—Lyons—That this council call a public meeting on Tuesday evening next, for the purpose of learning the public feeling in regard to Electric light for our streets.—Carried.

Brown—Haskett—That the Clerk be instructed to notify Oswald Walker and Aaron Teeter in reference to fences and that he call their attention to sub-section 17 of section 489 of the Municipal Act, and that they be enjoined not to erect other than wire fences along the highway.—Carried.

Lyons—Plewes—That the bill of Mr. McLean for boarding and lodging of two distitute travellers, amounting to \$1.50, be paid, and that Mr. Wm. Hughes be also paid the sum of one dollar for keeping a distressed and afflicted man one day and night at his hotel.—Carried.

Brown—Haskett—That the Clerk obtain 25 posters announcing a public meeting on Tuesday evening at 8 o'clock to discuss the Electric light question.—Carried.
Council adjourned.
