BY-LAW NO. 1.
A By-law to raise the sum of \$500 for the purpose of erecting a school house in Roman Catholic Separate School, in Section No. 5, Township of Glenelg, in the County of Grey, and to authorize the issue of debentures therefor.

Whereas the Trustees in the said, the Roman Catholic Separate School, in the said Township of Glenelg, in the County of Grey, and to authorize the issue of debentures therefor.

And whereas the amount of the whole rateable property of the said Roman Catholic Separate School in the said Section No. 5, according to the last Revised Assessment Roll being the Assessment Roll for the Township of Glenelg for the year 1889 amounts to \$40,715.

And whereas the existing debentures debt of the said Roman Catholic Separate School in the said Section No. 5, for principal is \$14 and for interest is \$14.

Wherefore the Trustees of the Roman Catholic Separate School in Section No. 5, in the Township of Glenelg, Enacts as follows:

(1) It shall be lawful for the Trustees of the said Roman Catholic Separate School for the purpose aforesaid to raise the said sum of Five hundred (\$500) dollars and to issue debentures of the corporation of the said school to the amount of the said sum of Five hundred dollars each, payable in the manner, and for the amounts, and at the times respectively set forth hereunder.

(2) The said debentures as to principal and interest shall be payable at the office of the Treasurer of the Municipality of the Township of Glenelg.

(3) It shall be lawful for the chairman of the said Roman Catholic Separate School Trustees and he is hereby authorized and instructed to sign and issue the said debentures hereby authorized to be issued, and to cause the same and the interest, coupons attached thereto to be stamped by the Secretary-Treasurer of the said school, and the said Secretary-Treasurer is hereby authorized to attach the Corporate seal of the said school to the said debentures.

(4) There shall be levied and collected in each year by a special rate on all the taxable property in the said section liable for such rate a sum sufficient to discharge the several instalments of principal and interest accruing due on the said debt according as hereunder set forth.

(5) The said debentures shall be made payable in annual instalments within five years from the date of issue thereof at the office of the said Treasurer of the Township of Glenelg, such instalment of such amount as hereunder set forth, and such debentures shall be in the form provided by the Act respecting Separate Schools, with coupons attached, signed by the chairman of the said Trustees and by the Secretary-Treasurer of the said Roman Catholic Separate School.

(6) That during the five years the currency of the debentures to be issued under the authority of this By-law the sum of one hundred and eighty cents (180c) shall be levied and collected in each year on all the taxable property in the said School Section, liable for such rate for the payment of the principal and interest on the said sum of five hundred dollars in the years hereinafter mentioned, namely:

(7) That the debentures to be issued hereunder may contain a provision in the following words: "This debenture or any interest thereon shall not after a certificate of ownership has been endorsed thereon by the Secretary-Treasurer of the Roman Catholic Separate School, and that such By-law was registered in the Registry Office of the South Riding of the County of Grey, at 10 o'clock, on the day of April, A. D. 1890. Any motion to quash or set aside the same or any part thereof, must be made within three months from the date of registration and cannot be made thereafter."

Editor Standard:
DEAR SIR,—In your issue of the 8th inst. we notice the communication of W. A. Brown, Sec.-Treas. of the Public School Board, so called, of School Section No. 1, Markdale. He first starts out by asserting that he wishes to explain to the ratepayers, but as we carefully read the letter through we find much to our regret that he explains nothing; that the whole letter is nothing but a gauzy bit of senseless verbosity ingeniously interwoven with a sickening, feeble wail by which he would have the meek and lowly ratepayers believe that his poor little heart was almost broken, that his poor little soul was almost crushed beneath its burdens and his poor little brain so worried and racked that it was gradually melting away into a state of blissful idiocy. He next expresses regret at the existing state of things regarding the school site, but in the next breath pleads ignorance of the law as the only, alighting reason for their blunders. Had neighbor Brown pleaded lunacy for himself and the other Trustees upon the board who side with him then the great tribunal—the people—before whom this case has been tried and determined upon would have been bound to accept his plea and given them a fair and impartial trial, but as he has entered his plea of ignorance instead of lunacy we must simply say that no court in Christendom recognizes a man's ignorance of the law in justification of any unlawful act upon his part. The law presumes that every man knows the law. This being a fact it is not a pitiable sight to see four of our Trustees stand up before the ratepayers of this S. S. and, like a class of over-grown shiftless school boys with hands thrust deep in their pockets as if feeling for an answer to the questions being put to them but being unsuccessful in their search at last in dire desperation blurt out we d-d-d-don't know. The facts regarding the history of this school site question are all quite green in the minds of the ratepayers, but to show the fallacy of the position of the four rebellious trustees who are clearly causing all the trouble and delay it will be necessary for us to briefly allude to them. Mr. Brown, as clerk of the school board, called the first primary meeting of the ratepayers of the section for the purpose, as Mr. Lyons and Mr. Brown stated in the meeting, of ascertaining the wishes of the people regarding the location and building of a school house. Surely there was nothing wrong or nothing illegal in calling such a meeting of the ratepayers, on the contrary it was right and just to do so. At this meeting Trustees Lyons and Brown stated that the Trustees wished to be relieved of all responsibility regarding the location of the school site. After a full discussion, in which Trustee Irwin fully acquiesced in the position the other trustees had taken and after the trustees had asked to be relieved of all responsibility as to location, it was resolved by a unanimous vote of the meeting, that the trustees be instructed to examine the various school sites, see what they could be purchased for, after which they were to call a meeting of the ratepayers, at which meeting they were to discuss the desirability of the various sites so reported by the trustees and decide which they would ask them to take. The trustees who were at the meeting, and we think they were all there, heartily agreed to this proposition. And as Trustee Henry Irwin happily expressed it, "In as much as the school house was to be built by the people and for the people why not let them say where and how it should be built." Everybody there echoed his sentiments by a hearty here, here! In pursuance with this understanding the trustees obtained tenders, called another meeting of the ratepayers, at which they reported the sites tendered for. This meeting was large and representative. The merits of the respective sites were fully discussed. It was finally decided to submit the question of location to the people to decide by ballot, to this the trustees fully assented and seemed quite well pleased at being so easily relieved from any responsibility in the location further than to aid the ratepayers by casting their votes for the location which best suited them individually. Mr. Brown, as clerk, gave proper notice of the polling day, had the ballots printed and everything put in readiness. The vote was finally polled and resulted in selecting a portion of the old fair ground as the site to be chosen by the trustees. Up to the time the polls closed everything was conducted upon the fairest terms possible and it was all as agreeable as it was fair. But when the polls closed and it was found that the site espoused by Trustee Brown had lost by quite a large majority then quicker than a flash from an electric dynamo the air

In pursuing the course that they do they are setting themselves up in direct opposition to the great constitutional rights of the Canadian people and to that other principle to which we point with so much pride, "British fair play." If there is litigation it will be brought on by the pure obstinacy of the four rebellious trustees. The people want nothing more than their rights and these they insist upon though they are compelled to go into the courts for them. If the four rebellious trustees are so fearful of "stigmatizing their honest convictions" why do they not resign and come up again for re-election. The people have not been over-bearing nor hasty in this matter but they are firm and unflinching as they are clearly satisfied that they have right, justice, law and a large majority upon their side. If the communistic trustees are honest in saying that they wish to avoid litigation and will work for the best interest of the section they must do one of two things—to prove the truth of their words they must either resign or proceed at once to locate the school house upon the site chosen by the people, either in an easy course and as fair and honorable as it is easy.
