Glenelg Council.

Town Hall Glenelg, June 9, 90. The Council met pursuant to adjournment, all the members present. The Reeve in the chair, minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed communications and petitions read as follows: From Chas. McArthur and 30 others asking for the renewal of "Neil's Bridge;" from Hugh Baird and 39 others calling the attention of Council to the state of the road between lots 10 and 15 con. 12; from the Township Treasurer, his Financial Statement; Beaton—Davis—that the semi-annual statement of the treasurer be filed in the clerk's office.—Carried.

Beaton—Davis—That a committee of the whole council appointed at last meeting to examine and report on the necessity of building a bridge across Sangeen river at lot 5 con. 9, do not now report on same but that they report at next meeting of Council.—Carried.

Neil—Staples—That \$125.00 be granted each commissioner to be expended on the roads, for 1890, and that the Treasurer pay the several amounts on the order of the Road Commissioners.—Carried.

Staples—Beaton—That the Treasurer be instructed to purchase the debenture of Separate School Trustees, of Separate School Section No. 5, of the Township of Glenelg, amounting to \$500.00 and payable in 5 year instalments at 6 per cent per annum interest, and that the Reeve and Clerk be authorized to countersign a cheque for the amount of \$517.63.—Carried.

Cheques were issued as follows:—James T. Wilson, work on townline G & A in 1889, \$3.00; Polling places for Ontario Elections, \$4.00 each, \$16.00; Members of Council Committee work \$1.00 each, \$5.00. The Council adjourned to July 7th at 10 a. m.

Following is a copy of a letter sent to Grey County Council at its last session: it will explain itself, and also commend itself to the good judgement of our readers.

HANOVER, June 23, 1890.

Gentlemen.—The policy of granting subsidies to Local Railways was inaugurated several years ago by the Dominion Government and has been carried on ever since. Large sums are yearly granted for this purpose. Last session about three and a half millions were given to aid railways throughout the Dominion, without discussing the wisdom of this policy I wish to call the attention of your Honorable Body to the position of the county of Grey in reference to this question, you are all aware of the debt incurred by your country in securing railway facilities. You are also all well aware that you have not been aided with any assistance from the Dominion Treasury. Such being the case does it not appear quite proper, that when you build your own railways and are called upon to pay a share to subsidize other railways in the Dominion that you should in justice and fairplay look for a refund of a portion at least of the bonuses you have granted to the different railways in your country? It has always appeared so to me and since this policy of subsidizing local railways has been continued by the Dominion Government it comes with even greater force. Had this policy been of only temporary duration the claims of Grey and a few other counties might have been passed over but now that it appears to be a fixed institution justice demands that we should claim what we are fairly entitled to.

At the last session of the House of Commons the matter was discussed when the Railway subsidies were under consideration, as a result of the discussion the Premier assured us that our claims for a refund would be considered if presented at the next session of parliament.

I mail you a hansard containing the debate on this subject and hope as the matter is one of great importance to the county that the Council will take such action to secure justice to the county as to them may seem right and proper.

The deep interest I take in the welfare of the county must be my excuse for troubling you in this matter.
