DEANERY OF GREY.

The fifth annual Convention of this Association was held in Christ church, Markdale, Wednesday, July 16th.

The officers present were, President, Rev. Horace E. Bray, Markdale; Vice-President, Miss Mockler, Durham; Cor.-Secretary, R. D. Bigger, Esq., Markdale.

There were also present, Rev. A. D. Dewdney and 24 delegates, Durham; Rev. T. E. Fairlie and 9 delegates, Meaford; Rev. W. A. Graham, Shelburne; Rev. T. L. Armstrong and one other, Chatsworth; Rev. A. Corbett, Dundalk; 8 delegates, Owen Sound; 3 delegates, Berkeley; 1 delegate, Sarawack; Miss Kingsmill, London; also about 25 from Markdale.

About 75 sat down to dinner at the rectory. The ladies of the congregation had spared no pains to make a success, the large reception room where the tables were set being beautifully decorated with flowers and ferns.

The service in the church at 1:30 p. m. was well attended, and about 50 communicated. The service was conducted by the Revs. W. A. Graham, A. D. Dewdney, T. L. Armstrong, and the Rector. At 2:15 the president called the meeting to order in the school room. The following papers were then discussed:

I. How to teach little children, read by Miss Kingsmill, London.

II. How to get and train young teachers, by Rev. A. D. Dewdney, Durham.

III. Sunday School records, the best method, by Rev. A. D. Dewdney, Durham.

IV. Merits of the different Leaflets in use, by Rev. T. L. Armstrong, Chatsworth.

V. The importance of teaching church history and polity in our Sunday Schools, by Rev. T. E. Fairlie, Meaford.

VI. The duties of a Sunday School teacher with regard to his or her class besides the actual teaching, by Mrs. Gregg, Owen Sound.

These papers, which were exceptionally good, called forth much praise, and also considerable discussion.

Discussion also followed upon the subjects of "Pure Deconal Statistics" and "Catechising," after which the appointment of next place of meeting and the election of officers took place.

Owen Sound was the place selected and the time of meeting the second Wednesday in July, 1891.

The following officers were then elected: President, Ven. Arch. Deacon Mulholland; Vice-President, Miss Mockler, Durham; Cor. Secretary, Miss Gordon, Owen Sound; Rec. Secretary, R. D. Bigger, Esq., Markdale.

The president then adjourned the meeting with the Benediction.

Tea was partaken of in the rectory by the delegate, and the group afterwards photographed on the lawn.

The visitors then departed, expressing themselves as well pleased with their reception, and congratulating the Markdale congregation on the beautiful church, grounds and rectory which they possess.

Euphrasia Council.

The council met pursuant to adjournment, on July 4th, 1890. Members all present. Minutes of last session of council read and confirmed. The Reeve was authorized to get a culvert built on 7th line, lot 17.

The Reeve and Mr. Paterson were appointed to inspect the road, at lot 7, concession 9, and get repairs made here if they deem it prudent.

Mr. Patterson was authorized to get repairs made on 15 and 16 side line, in concession 12.

The Reeve and Mr. Paterson were instructed to examine the road allowance, of 9 and 10 side line, and get the road opened, 2 rods wide, if they deem it prudent, and also to get improvements made on the Saugeen hill, 11th line.

The Reeve and Mr. McKnight were appointed to inspect 3 and 4 side line, concessions 5 and 6, with a view to the opening of the same, for public travel.

The Reeve and Mr. Stuart were authorized to get side line 6 and 7, in the 1st and 2nd concessions, opened.

The Reeve's orders were issued on the Treasurer as follows, viz:—Mr. Stuart \$3.50, to pay for work on valley road. J. Paterson, printer \$20, part payment on contract. M. Roy 75c, for cedar. Mr. Paterson \$81.50, to pay men for work on roads. James Nelson \$5.00, to pay for work on town line Artemesia, the council of Artemesia paying equally. John Hutchinson \$15.00, to pay for work in his road division. Robert J. McAfee \$35.00, to pay for shoveling gravel.

Robert Dunlop, Clerk, \$30.00, part salary for current year. Henry Lawrence \$4.00, for building culvert. Richard Braniff \$6.25, work on town line Artemesia. John Camaack \$8.60, building culvert. James Camplin \$17.25, building culvert. James Perry \$5.00, to pay for shoveling gravel. William Charters \$1.50, repairing road scraper. John Egan \$4.95, building culvert. Benjamin Smith \$5.00, cedar for culvert. Noble Clark \$10.00, to pay for shoveling gravel. Richard Shores \$15.00, relief for W. Gilroy, indigent. Robert Champlin \$3.50, building culvert.

Council adjourned until the last Friday in July inst.

A Burglary at Thornbury.

GOVERNMENT DETECTIVE MURRAY HAS AN EXCITING EXPERIENCE WITH A COMPLE OF MAGISTRATES—THEY WILL BE REPORTED

On Dec. 28, 1889, the store of W. C. Myers, a merchant of Thornbury, County of Grey, was entered by burglars and \$700 worth of plushes, silks, furs and other expensive goods carried away. Detective Murray was instructed by the government to make inquires, and searched the residences of several suspected parties in the village and at Clarksburg. The officer strongly suspected that the house of Myers' father-in-law, Henry Bull, would reveal the presence of some of the goods, as one or two of Bull's sons did not bear the best of characters, but Myers strongly objected to the search and it was not prosecuted. Detective Murray kept his eye on the parties, however, and recently learned that Ed. Bull had a suit of clothes made by a tailor about 20 miles away, the goods of which the suit had been made answering the description of a piece of tweed that had been in Myer's store for several years, owing to its odd pattern. The detective visited the scene a week ago and laid plans and returned again last Monday week and swore out search warrants for the premises of Mrs. Parsley, temperance hotel keeper of Clarksburg, where Ed. Bull was in the habit of hanging out. Mrs. Parsley, who is a large powerful woman, showed fight when the detective, a constable and Mr. Myers put in an appearance, and threatened to throw the trio out of the window. A search of the bedroom disclosed a piece of myrtle-colored cashmere, which was identified by Myers. Detective Murray then drove to Thornbury and arrested Ed. Bull. The house of his father, Henry Bull, was next searched and a large quantity of dress goods, silk plush, underclothing and another suit which Henry Bull, Jr., had made up. The detective then started on the lookout for the latter, who was arrested about 15 miles away while peddling pumps. The prisoner said his father had bought the goods in Barrie, but the old gentleman denied that he had ever seen them. The accused were brought before Mayor Raymond and S. Webb, J. P. at Thornbury. The proceedings lasted from 8 a. m. Tuesday until 1 1/2 Wednesday morning, when Ed. Bull was committed to Owen Sound jail and the magistrate discharged Henry Bull. The greatest excitement reigned in the village.

Henry Bull will doubtless be re-arrested, together with several others believed to be implicated. Mr. Myers and his clerks positively identified the goods as having been stolen from the store. As a result of the discharge of Henry Bull Detective Murray, who arrived in the city last night, will report the magistrates to the Government.
