A PROSPEROUS ENTERPRISE.

Moffat & Sons, Pearl line of stoves, is becoming well known through western Ontario, and highly popular wherever used. This firm is pushing the stove business with commendable enterprise, and tho' doubling its capacity during the last two years is still much hampered for room and will be compelled to enlarge the premises. Over five hundred stoves have this summer been manufactured, and twelve hundred is expected to be reached before New Year's. Their traveller reports greatly improved prospects from that of last year. This is partly owing to the improved state of trade through the country and partly because the Pearl line of stoves is taking so well and giving such satisfaction that people will have them. It could not otherwise be as the firm is composed of a family of superior mechanics each member having not only a branch or specialty to manage in the manufacture of the stoves but also having an interest in the business each will thus naturally endeavor to excel. We are highly pleased to have such a prosperous business in our town and trust the place as well as the Railway Company will treat it in such a manner as to establish its permanence.

—An Ohio company is seeking a site for a factory at West Toronto Junction that is to give employment to 600 men.

—Farmers in western Ontario pronounce the growth of the two-rowed barley seed imported from England by the Dominion Government a grand success.

—Italy has ordered the study of English to be added to the curriculum of all Italian universities, and has endowed the necessary professorships for the purpose.

—On Tuesday, the 29th July, Saginaw, Mich., had a terrible fire; 19,000,000 feet of lumber was burned and a number of saw mills, planing mills and other property to the value of \$375,000.

—The house of Rev. David Plumb, a prominent Methodist minister of Cole, Indiana, was burned early in the morning of the 29th July. The minister, his wife and three children perished in the fire.
