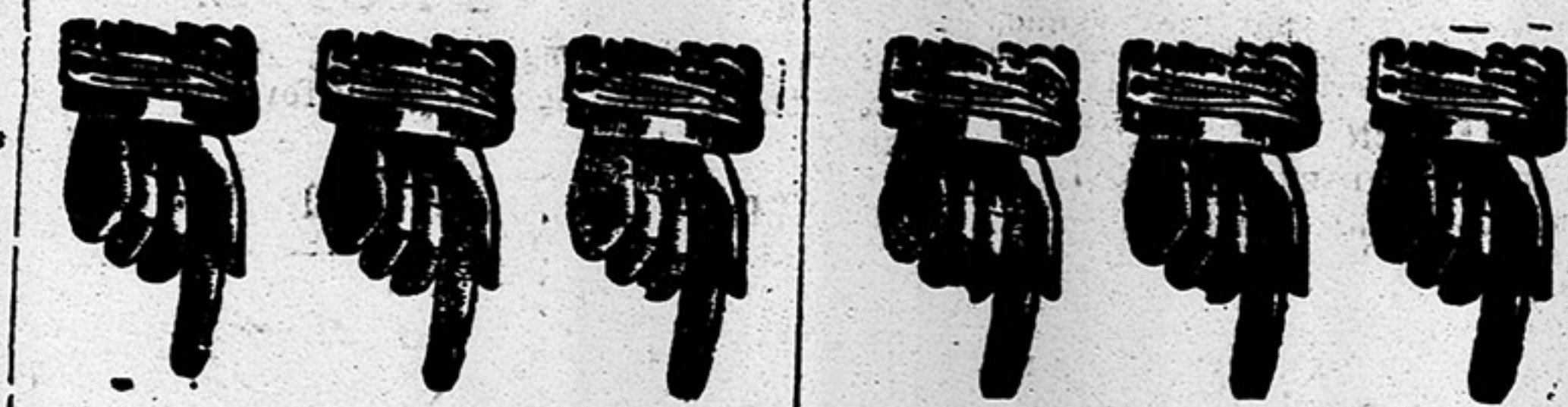

DISTRICT DOTS.

The Dufferin Post takes a holiday this week.

In another week Manitoba harvest will be in full swing and is expected to be the best in ten years.

The A. O. U. W. and Foresters of Shelburne will hold a union picnic in that village on the 15th August.

An attempt is being made to have the Elora branch of the Canadian Pacific Railway extend to Stratford.

Toronto liquor dealers are organizing so as to raise the price of whiskey to 10 cents a glass from September 1st.

Waterloo farmers have decided to raise flax, start a binder twine factory in Berlin next year and thus manufacture their own twine.

Out of a population of seventy thousand Bruce county has but one prisoner in the county jail, and that one is an Indian girl.

Edward Bull, of Thornbury, who was recently arrested on a charge of larceny, has been convicted and sentenced to three months in jail.

Orangeville Board of Health has resigned in disgust because the Council would not co-operate in their commendable yet averous task.

The Warton Echo quill driver takes a rest this week and his subscribers will be obliged to fast a week for their customary liberal news rations.

On Friday last the C. P. R. station at Winnipeg was struck by lightning and set on fire, but was saved from entire destruction by the fire brigade. Loss \$10,000.

An accident at the Sault St. Marie canal last week caused the closing of the canal for a week, and it is estimated the delay will cause a loss of \$1,000,000 to ship owners.

Mr. James Noble of the Ross House, Owen Sound, suffered a serious loss last week in the death by inflammation of his Clydesdale stallion "Dandy Jim." The horse was worth \$1,500.

Meaford High School is to have the Smead system of heating and ventilation. This is the most perfect system known at present and should be introduced in all public buildings where practicable.

Ira Peters, a lad of about 14 years, Dr. Cameron's stable boy in Owen Sound, was found hung by a halter strap one day last week in the Dr's stable. He was liberated and after several hours medical assistance recovered consciousness and is O. K. again.
