### Struck by a Steamer.

COLLINGWOOD, Aug. 10.—A party of seven, two ladies, four gentlemen and a boy, had a very narrow escape from drowning on Friday morning last off Munday's Lighthouse, near Byng Inlet. The party consisted of Miss Duffy and Miss Watts, of Collingwood; Walter Price, of Rochester; Joe Marks, of Meaford; Thomas Bowie, of Collingwood; J. McInnes, of Meaford, and Robert Clark, of Collingwood. They were in a sail boat and came out to meet the steamer City of Midland to take two passengers off to shore. The man in charge of the sail boat crossed the bow of the steamer, which crashed down upon them, splitting the boat almost in two and turning the entire party into the water. Young Clark, a boy of fourteen, saw the accident could not be avoided and dived from the boat before the crash. On coming up he saw the ladies in the water and tried to rescue Miss Duffy, but the under-current carried him back. Miss Duffy had gone down twice and was four feet under the water for the last time when rescued by McInnes. Joe Marks rescued Miss Watts, who was unconscious when taken on board. A lifeboat was lowered from the City of Midland, and the whole party rescued after being in the water fifteen minutes.
