NOTE AND COMMENT.

-Winnipeg has a population of 25,000.

-Cardinal Newman died in London | hand about 3 o'clock. on Monday last aged 90 years.

-Silver ore valued at \$36,000 was shipped from Port Arthur last Friday.

-An Ottawa press says it is currently reported that parliament wil meet Nov. 15.

-The U. S. Congress will spend \$5,000,000 in needed canal improvements at Sault St. Marie.

-The general conference of the Methodist church, of Canada, opens at Montreal, on September 10.

-The amount of exempted property in Montreal is \$19,745,210, and crusade against tax exemptions is to be instituted.

-While last year Manitoba had to import several hundred thousand dollars worth of oats, this year she will export a couple of millions worth.

-Kimber, the murderer, paid the penalty of his crime at the Auburn state prison on Wednesday of last week by the new process, death by electricity.

-Two by-laws were passed in Galt on Thursday last, one to raise \$125, 000 for the construction of waterworks and the other for local improvements.

-Editor Commins, of the Springfield, Ohio, Buget, was drubbed one day last week by two muscular women whom the editor had scandalized in an article in his paper.

-A vote was taken in Toronto last Wednesday on seven by-laws to raise in all \$729,253, only two of which were carried, viz: The Boys' Industrial School \$20,000, and the Girls Industrial School \$20,000.

An Important Decision.

Mr. Justice McMahon delivered a lengthy judgement on Saturday last in reference to the injunction against the removal of Victoria College from Cobourg. The case was tried at Cobourg without a jury on Nov. 1889; at Toronto, Nov. 12, 1889, and made in a tew minutes while waiting. Feb. 26. 1890. His Lordship decides that compensation must be paid the town of Cobourg as well as the subscribers to the institution, but that there has been no agreement that the College should remain in Cobourg in perpetuity. College Federation is now assured without further litigation.
