Durham is to have a new skating rink, sure.

The Thornbury Standard takes a holiday this week.

Mr. Thos. Brown, one of Durham's first settlers, died last week aged 80 years.

Seventy-five acres of Fort William land has just been sold by the C. P. R. for \$20,000.

Elora and Ferns A. O. U. W. had an excursion last week to Owen Sound when 960 took in the trip and had a pleasant time.

The flour and cornmeal mills of C. Macdonell & Sons, of Collingwood, was destroyed by fire on Sunday morning. Loss \$85,000. Insurance \$22,000.

Owen Sound is to have a third weekly paper and a daily in connection next month. The chances for success of the latter does not appear to us encouraging.

The Presbyterians of Dixie and Cooksville, near Streetsville, had a lawn party two weeks ago at which one thousand people attended, and \$200 was taken in.

Mr. Fawcett, editor of the Streetsville Review, is this week visiting friends at Flesherton, together with his wife and family. He doesn't publish any paper this week.

The saw, stingle and chopping mills at Damascus, five miles from Arthur, were burned down two weeks ago. They were owned by Dr. Robinson of Arthur. Loss \$5,000. No insurance.

SOLD OUT.—Mr. A. F. Campbell, M. P. for Algoma, has sold the Brampton Conservator to Mr. Thomas Charters, late foreman of the Woodstock Sentinel-Review. Mr. Campbell will start a new paper in Sault Ste. Marie, Ont.

Thos. Mann, bus driver for Somers Hotel, Chatsworth, was last week fined for overstepping the rules laid down by the railway agent for soliciting passengers coming off the train, and for assulting the agent who tried to hinder said breach of the rules. The fines and cost amounted to \$14.65.

An exchange says it is said Mr. John Blyth, the defeated candidate at the election for the Legislative Assembly, is to oppose Dr. Landerkin for South Grey if he will accept that nomination. Should he decline either Jas. Allen of Egremont or Victor Lang of Neustadt is the second choice of the Conservatives.

The Streetsville Review is now two years under the present management and is one of our brightest and best gotten up exchanges. Mr. Fawcett has made a vast improvement in the Review since he took the reigns and also excels in job printing. The Standard is pleased to be thus able to speak of the success of a former next-neighbor.

Sudden Death.
