

A Victim of Laudanum. PHYSICIAN. (From a Special Correspondence.) SHELBURNE, Sept. 22.-Dr. D. R. Johnston

of Horning's Mills died on Saturday night from an overdose of laudanum. He was in Shelburne during the afternoon and was under the influence of liquor. He started for home at 6 o'clock, but he did not reach Horning's Mills until 8,30. The distance is only six miles. It was feared this evening that he took the wrong road on arriving at the cemetery. He was seen on the Toronto and Sydenham road, and inquired the way to Horning's Mills. This will account for the length of time it took him to reach home. Mr. Phœnix, his uncle, with whom he boarded, heard him drive into the stable, and after waiting a few minutes went out to see what detained the doctor and found him lying insensible on the stable floor. He was remoyed to the house, and his friends worked with him for some minutes to endeavor to arouse him from what seemed to be a state of extreme intoxication. Failing in their efforts, they sent for Dr. Reid, who also practices at Horning's Mills, but every effort was fruitless. Soon the suspicion crossed the mind of the attending physician and the friends that the patient was under the influence of a deadly narcotic, so a search was instituted. On examining his pockets an empty whiskey bottle, au eight ounce one, was found, also an
